McBride Discusses "Republican Plans"

MILWAUKEE, May 26 (AP)—P. Scott McBride, national superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, told an audience in the West Allis Methodist church last night that the entrance of Dwight W. Morrow as a senatorial candidate in New Jersey might portend the desire of the republican party to have a wet candidate in readiness for the 1932 presidential race.

"Morrow is internationally known as a statesman and is recognized as a very able man," McBride said. "He certainly would rank as presidential caliber. He may win the first hurdle, but as a wet he'd never be elected president."
