### Six Records In Danger At Coming Intercollegiate A. A. A. Meet

NEW YORK (AP)—Aside from the anticipated battle royal for the team championship between Stanford and Southern California, the Intercollegiate A. A. A. track and field championships at Harvard Stadium, May 29-31, likely will witness record-breaking performances in at least four, if not six, of the fifteen events.

Over of Stanford and Wyckoff, Southern California, have touched 9 3/4 for the 100-yard dash this spring several times and if either duplicates this time, the record of 9 7/16 will be wiped off the books. Both, however, face a formidable foe in Eddie Tolan, Michigan's negro star, the national A. A. A. champion and world record holder.

Both, Stanford, has heaved the shot nearly two feet beyond his own present 117.5 feet. A. A. A. record of 56 feet, 2 inches, made last year. Ryan, also a Stanford athlete, who has beaten the world's record, hopes to better his own distance record of 154 feet, 11 inches.

Southern California's sophomore high jumper, Bob Van Orsdel, has cleared 6 feet, 7 inches, better than the existing meet mark, and at least two Western javelin tossers, Mortenson of St. C. and Churchill of California, have a chance to eclipse the record of 265 feet, 7 1/2 inches.

The 22-year old record of 25 1/2 seconds for the low hurdles was bettered 1-10 of a second last year by Sid Kieselhorst of Yale, two-time defending champion, but the mark was not allowed due to wind aid.

It may be beaten this time with Kieselhorst as well as Smith of Stanford, Welch of Southern California and Bonalotti of California to force a fast pace. This year Pennsylvania has one of the greatest all-around stars now in college in Barney Bersinger, who may score well in four or five events. The Quakers also have a star crop of distance runners, including Bill McKeliff, mile favorite, and figure to lead the eastern pack.

Cornell has two of the best eastern hurdlers in Heasley and Clark. Harvard has speed and a star hurdler in William Vonpeck. Yale has Kieselhorst and a 440 ace in Engle. Princeton has the high jump titleholder, Ben Hedges. Bates has the 220-yard favorite, Russell Chapman, and Georgetown the 160-yard champion, Karl Wildermath.

### WILLING BEATEN BY YOUNG CLERK

Member of Walker Cup Team Eliminated in Second Round in Scotland

ST. ANDREWS, May 27 (AP)—Donald K. Moir, Walker Cup team star, was defeated by Rex W. Hartley, British Walker Cup player and winner of the St. George's challenge vase, four up and two to play.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 27 (AP)—Dr. C. W. Willing of Portland, Ore., member of the American Walker cup team, was eliminated in the second round of the British amateur golf championship today by William Spark, Scottish golfer, 2 and 1.

Dr. Willing's defeat was the first major American casualty in the current championship. His elimination reduced the American contingent to sixteen where 24 were in the field when play began yesterday. Seven Americans of lesser renown were eliminated yesterday and Edward C. Davis, of Salem, Mass., was put out earlier today.

Willing fought gamely all the way but from the first hole where Spark shot a birdie at him the Portland dentist couldn't get the touch of the racing greens nor solve the problem of stiff crosswinds.

#### Led But Once

Willing was ahead only once during the match and then only for the duration of one hole's play. Trailing by one hole at the turn, the American won the eighth to square the match and the twelfth to take the lead but the Scotsman won the thirteenth to even the match and then went into the lead again at the fifteenth where Dr. Willing needed five. The sixteenth was halved in four but the match ended on the next green where Dr. Willing's best was a six.

On the first nine, Spark opened first with a birdie three at the first hole but Willing squared the match at the third. The sixth and seventh were evenly divided leaving the match all square but Spark went into the lead on the short eighth with a par three and rounded the turn with a one hole lead.

The tide turned in Willing's favor at the seventh where Spark's tee shot rolled over the lip of the green down to the bank of the Eden river. His second skidded down the steep green and nearly blanketed Willing's hole, shot stopped dead in the sand before the green. He clipped half the hole and ran a cutting putt dead for a four.

Willing won the twelfth after Spark slipped one of his few short putts.

Lists Lead Immediately  
Holding the lead for the first time, the American proceeded to lose it immediately, being short with his brassie shot to the 410 yard thirteenth, needing five for the hole. Willing failed with another holeable putt on the fifteenth and was one down and three to go and the match assumed the aspects of a real battle. The sixteenth was halved in four.

The famous seventeenth hole where Willing was one down with two to go saw the American's finish. The noted 467 yard dog-leg fairway to the hole, known throughout the world of golf as the "road hole," has proved the downfall of many champions.

Both drives sailed far over the stone wall and sheds cutting away distance. Second shots call for much golf strategy. Willing played first and played safe before the green. Spark had fortune with him for he topped his iron and after carrying scarcely 75 yards the ball rolled and bounded over the bunkers of the fairway to within the white line marking the green. Willing chipped his third but it raked over the cup 40 feet beyond the pin. Spark was short with his putt of almost the same distance. Willing's long putt from back of the green never was on the proper line and it stopped five feet away. Spark laid his dead six inches from the cup and as Willing missed his to keep the match alive he smilingly congratulated the young Scotsman on his fine play.

#### 20-Year-Old Bank Clerk

Spark, Willing's conqueror, is a 20-year-old bank clerk from Montrose, Scotland, and a virtual unknown so far as British golf is concerned.

The gallery which grew as the Willing-Spark match was home was as much surprised at the Oregonian's defeat as were other members of the American Walker cup team.

### SENATORS TRIM YANKS 10 TO 7

Washington and Philadelphia Proceed Blithely on Victorious Way.

While their highly touted brethren falter and stumble, the Washington Senators proceed blithely on their victorious way in the American league (much as the St. Louis Cardinals and Brooklyn Robins, "dark horses" both, are doing in the National).

Picked in advance predictions to finish no higher than seventh, the Senators, under great leadership by Walter Johnson, were leading the pack by four full games today and giving no signs of cracking under the amazing pace they have set.

Sixth Straight Win  
Yesterday they scored their sixth successive victory and their 15th in 19 games, beating the New York Yankees, 10 to 7. Stalling a year from the Yankees' own heels, the Senators won on home runs. Joe Judge and Goose Goslin hit successive home runs in the fifth and repeated the feat in the fourth, thus accounting for six runs. The second blast from the Washington batsmen was the high spot of a seven-run rally that swept Vernon Gomez off the mound and won the ball game.

Cleveland bounced back into third place with a double victory over the Chicago White Sox, 7 to 3, and Wes Ferrell outpitched Red Faber by a wide margin in the opener and Clint Brown had an edge on Cecil Caraway in the nightcap.

Grove Wins Again  
Lefty Grove chalked up his sixth win without a defeat as the Athletics beat Boston 8 to 5. Grove had only one had inning, the eighth, when the Red Sox bunched hits for four runs.

The Detroit Tigers made good use of eight hits to beat St. Louis, 7 to 3, and Arvids into sixth place while the Browns fell back to seventh.

In the National league, Brooklyn and St. Louis each recorded victories to keep the Cardinals on top of the league standings by half a game.

Vance Shuts Out Giants  
The Dodgers gave their metropolitan rivals, the New York Giants, their fifth straight defeat, 7 to 0, as Dazzy Vance turned in his best effort of the year. Vance gave the Giants only two hits, one a single, and permitted only two men to get as far as second base.

The Cardinals turned back Pittsburgh, 10-4, for their eighth straight win and their 17 in 18 games. The Cards shelled Joe Petty off the mound with a four-run rally in the fourth while Lindsay, following Sherdell in the sixth, was a puzzle to the corsairs.

### WOMEN DEFEAT FRENCH TEAM BY SIX POINTS

St. Germain-en-Laye, France, May 27 (AP)—American women golfers defeated a team of French women today 16-12 to 11-2, the victory, led by Glenna Collett, winning three foursomes, seven singles and halving one singles match. The French women, captained by Simone Thion de la Chaume, won two foursomes, two singles and scored one half in singles.

The most interesting match was waged between the rival captains, Miss Collett, defeating Miss Thion de la Chaume, two up after a battle continuing to the home green.

The French captain, however, with Marie A. M. Vagliano as her partner, defeated Miss Collett and Miss Bernice Wall in the foursomes, two up, the same score by which the singles match between the two companions was later decided.

The Seals, returning from a prosperous road trip, are in fourth place, two games behind Sacramento, having won two out of three series they played on the road. First in the second division, but so close as to make the distinction between divisions useless, are the Missions, who just finished taking Seattle for six out of eight games.

Hollywood, a team which was expected to be higher in the standings this year, though in sixth now, appears to have set a winning pace.
