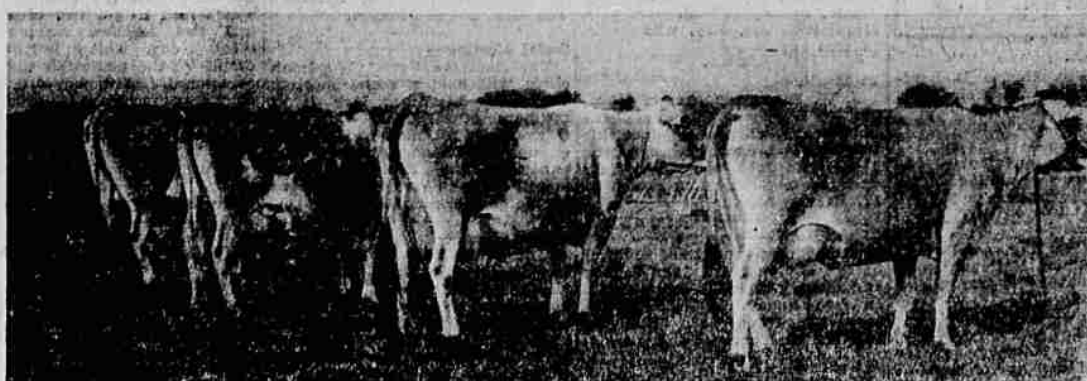

Prune Surplus Of This State Is Looked Into

The surplus of prunes in Oregon has recently been the object of a very and the Oregon Experiment station and the decision which they have reached after carefully looking the situation from every possible angle is that the canning of fresh prunes as a means of using the surplus, or even the bulk of the crop is a future possibility.

At present the canning industry takes only about 8 to 10 per cent of the northwest prune production, and the total output amounts to only about 9.2 per cent of the entire northwest fruit pack and but 1.5 per cent of the nation's annual production of canned fruits.

The study was made by Dr. Milton N. Nelson, agricultural of the experiment station, and W. H. Belden, a former assistant in that department. Their investigations covered present and prospective volume of production of prunes in all countries, utilization of the production in the northwest, volume and distribution of the entire canned fruit pack of the country, the production and distribution of canned prunes in the northwest, and the factors for and against this product in both production and consumption.

Pointing to the growing importance of this canned product and its favor with the public in its increased use in the last few years. Since 1925 the canned prune pack has exceeded in rate the growth of the total fruit pack both in the Northwest and in the United States as a whole.

The annual production of canned prunes at present is approximately that of Hawaiian pineapple or canned apricots just 20 years ago, the investigators found. Since that time production of canned pineapple has increased 16-fold and canned apricots 6 fold. A 12 fold increase in canned prune production would consume the entire production of the northwest prune acreage for canning purposes.

The prune industry in the United States is confined largely to California and the Pacific Northwest, while the production of the Italian prune, the favorite one for canning because of its tart flavor, is entirely a northwest monopoly, hence any development in the canning of fresh prunes would be unaffected by fluctuations in prune acreage in California where the bulk of the world's crop of drying prunes are grown.

"The Oregon prune has undoubtedly excellence for canning," the report points out, "it being a tart-sweet prune of large size and fine flavor. Many consumers, however, have never heard of the canned fresh prune and large numbers are unfamiliar with its merits. The result is that where retailers carry the product at all, they complain of slow turnover and in consequence feel obliged to charge prices that give prunes to advantage over canned fruit that may cost a great deal more to produce."

"Prunes have an advantage over certain other acid fruits in that they do not pinch or swell in the can," the report continues, "since the adoption of the can lined can there have been no complaints of spoiling and in addition the color is well preserved."

"The canned prune enjoys certain distinct advantages over most other fruits in cost or producing and processing. The raw product is cheaper, the loss of weight before putting in the can is less, and the labor cost in preparing the prunes for canning is considerably lower than for most other fruits."

Requirements for expanding the market for canned prunes discussed by Dr. Nelson and Mr. Belden are concerted advertising and sales promotion, adoption of more attractive nomenclature, and greater uniformity of pack. To bring these about will require that growers themselves indicate a lively interest in the program and that canneries cooperate in such a unified program, conclude the investigators.
