FRENCH LABOR INSURANCE SYSTEM IN EFFECT JULY 1

PARIS (AP)—French workers earning low pay will be protected from sickness, old age and death after July 1, when the national social insurance law becomes effective.

Insurance is obligatory on all wage earners who earn less than 1,500 francs a year. In the case of cities of 200,000 inhabitants or over the income limit is 1,800 francs.

The assessment is approximately 8 per cent for industrial workers and 2 per cent for farm workers, half to be paid by the employer and half by the worker.

Capital Without Railroad. TECUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP)—This Central American capital is one of the few seats of national government in the world without railroad facilities. Residents are of pure Spanish type and retain many of the customs of their ancestors. Gold was dug from a mine near here to supply Montezuma.
