minutes, thirty eight seconds the non-stop mark of nineteen hours, ten minutes, thirty two seconds set by Frank Havas, of Los Angeles, on June 27, 1929.

Daybreak in New York saw Turner away at 4:02:30 a. m. (C. S. T.). As the sun passed mid-heaven, Turner dropped into Wichita for gasoline, landing at 12:45 p. m. (C. S. T.) and leaving 30 minutes later after taking on 234 gallons of fuel. He had 450 gallons of gasoline aboard at New York. His ship favored him but a 23-mile-an-hour headwind cut down his plotted time to the Kansas stop.

The sun's last rays were fading the Pacific as the plane crossed the final range of mountains—the San Gabriel peaks—and roared over bare, a blue flame pouring from the exhausts of a wide open motor. Turner landed at 7:46:24 p. m. (C. S. T.). A Bon cut the pilot's flying partner on both trips, slept through the most of the flight. Once he tried to crawl from his bed among the gasoline tanks of the cabin to Turner's cockpit and "I had to bat him several times before I could get him back," the flier said.

"Everything went nicely," Turner said. "I wasn't hampered by motor trouble or such bad storms as I was going over. I may try for that west-to-east record later this summer. Right now, I am interested in getting a fast air express and mail line started from coast to coast.
Average 138 M. P. H.
I believe the line can be established to make the Los Angeles-New York trip in 18 hours and the westward trip in 20 hours. The west air always stronger against you coming west. Pilots would be made with a change of ships and pilots at each. What cities would be stops. I am not prepared to say."
Turner averaged 138 miles an hour on the westward flight against 126 miles for Hawks. He held the best currents were found at altitudes of 3,000 and 5,000 feet. His ship had a 550-horse-power motor while Hawks and Lindbergh used 425-horsepower motor.

He intends to run it personally as a packing plant and it will also be available for any local warehouse or storage needs. This adds another much needed facility to Union industries.

Tone of Butter Market Remains Weak In Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28 (AP)—Despite the price reductions made Monday, the tone of the butter market continues weak with offerings large and demand light.

Egg quotations are also weak, but price changes were announced.
Viewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:
"Oregon is now entering its strawberry season in earnest; but Portland's supplies continue limited, due to active outside demand. Several truck shipments to Puget Sound points are being made daily. The market is about steady at \$3.00 to \$3.25, with a few sales on the farmers' early market as high as \$3.75 for real fancy berries.

"Cantaloupes are more plentiful; Imperial valley markets are strong, though, and there are no price changes here.
"Apricots are in only moderate supply. There is a wide range in quality ranging from 60c to \$1.50 per dozen bunches.
"Tomatoes are cheaper, especially for lower quality stock. Both repacked tomatoes and original packs declined about 50c per lug.
"Celery, which was real active two weeks ago, is now very slow, and even though supplies are now light, there is little interest being shown. There are possibly too many local competitive green vegetables.

"Local peas are increasing in volume daily; but prices continue rather high, at 19c per lb."
MISTAKE IN CENSUS
ROSEBURG, Ore., May 28—(AP)—An error in the 1929 census report for Roseburg that has existed undetected for the past 19 years, today gave this city a substantial gain in population for the 1929 count.

Roseburg's population in 1929 was reported as 4381 when it should have been 4258, the count for 1926 gives Roseburg 4361 or a gain of 103 despite losses incurred by the removal of the railroad terminal in 1926.

DEADBEATS FOUND SCARCE BY SMALL LOAN CONCERNS
NEW YORK (AP)—Character has been called the most important factor in loaning money and this has been borne out by the experiences of the New Jersey Money Lenders' association.

Lending small loans for a wide variety of purposes the small loan companies, according to a survey just published, collected in 96 per cent of the cases.
Loans were secured by mortgages on household furniture.
Companies in New Jersey are permitted to loan amounts up to \$200 to any borrower at a rate not in excess of 3 per cent per month of the unpaid balance.

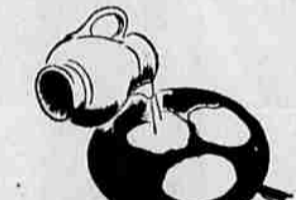
