

Radio Driving Out Bugs From Northwest Trees

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—Radio is being used by northwest horticulturists to rid apple trees and greenhouses of insect pests.

Fruit men of Washington and Idaho have put it to work in their orchards by using a series of antennae and ground wires, attached to a generator, which furnishes 110,000 volts of high frequency electricity. The current rushes from the antenna dancing above each tree through the trunk to the ground wires below and back to the generating machine.

The action of the current is said to be similar to that of a radio wave. The generator is considered the "broadcasting station," and the tree or plant the "receiver." The transmitted energy in the form of force vibrations causes the bugs to quit living.

Orchardists and state inspectors who have tested the system here and in the Wenatchee apple district say the current kills insect eggs, San Juan scale and other fruit parasites by "exploding" the cells and sterilizing them. Insects flying in the direct path of the current also are killed.

The federal radio commission has allocated hours for "buggy broadcasting" in orchards, so that the bug killers will not interfere with program reception or transmission.

The inventor of the system is the late Dr. H. N. Burglund, who is credited with extensive research in the field of radio and high frequency electricity.

POPULATION OF SEATTLE, WASH. NOW AT 362,426
SEATTLE (AP)—Preliminary census figures released here gave Seattle a population of 362,426 within its corporate limits and 419,210 by including its immediate fringe. The population of the metropolitan area was announced as 468,021.

The population within the city limits showed an increase of 14.8 per cent in 10 years. Seattle's population in 1920 was 313,312, twentyth in size in the United States, and in 1910 it was 237,194.

The metropolitan area, established through the cooperation of the United States Chamber of Commerce, and with sanction of the census bureau, takes in a large part of King county outside the city limits, a small portion of Snohomish county almost contiguous with the northern city limits, and a strip of Kitsap county, just across the bay from Seattle.

Census Supervisor Williams said the increase for Seattle and its immediate fringe was 13.9 per cent in 10 years and for the metropolitan area, 17.1 per cent.

Cardinal Lucon Dies In France

RIEIMS, France, May 29 (AP)—Cardinal Lucon, archbishop of Reims, 87-year-old Catholic prelate who stayed in Reims throughout its World war bombardment after most of the population had abandoned it, died here Wednesday.

He had been ill of bronchial pneumonia. It was known yesterday that his case was hopeless and the last sacrament was administered by his vicar general.

Cardinal Lucon was born at Maulevrier, diocese of Amiens, in October, 1842. He was 65 years in the priesthood and was one of the most loved figures of the Catholic church in France.

The cardinal became known to the world in general from 1914 to 1918 when he remained in Reims after almost everyone else had abandoned it because of the German bombardment. Cardinal Lucon remained and counted the shells that struck the famous cathedral, keeping close note of the progress of the damage.

Motor Stage Lines Will Consolidate

SALEM, Ore., May 29 (AP)—A consolidation of motor stage lines will be effective June 1 whereby Oregon Stages, Inc., the Dickwick Stages system and the California Transit company will cease to operate under those names, and will operate instead under the name of the Pacific Greyhound Lines, Inc.

An application was received by the public service commission from the Pacific Greyhound Lines for the permits of operation now held by the other three lines.

COMMISSIONER WILL SEEK CHANGE IN SOCCER RULES

NEW BEDFORD, Mass. (AP)—Proposals for changes in the United States Football association's rules regulating soccer referees have been placed in the agenda for the association's annual meeting in Atlantic City, N. J., June 12.

Samuel Morris, commissioner for the association in the New Bedford district, is sponsor for the proposals, which in effect would abolish the United States Referees' association headed by Edward J. Gilman, of New York, and place regulation of referees directly in the hands of leagues, associations and cup competitions affiliated with the U. S. F. A.

Asserting he is assured of backing from a part of the delegates to the coming meeting, Morris declared "there is widespread dissatisfaction with the present handling of the soccer arbiters."

8000 WITNESS EIGHT-ROUND SEATTLE TILT
SEATTLE, Wash., May 28 (AP)—Eight thousand fans—Seattle's largest indoor fight crowd—saw their first eight round bout at home in many years here last night when Tony Portillo, Los Angeles welterweight, scored a decision over "Wildcat" Carter, Everett, Wash., negro, in the feature match of a triple main event benefit show.

Dodo Duff, Seattle's Monroe "beast" and now a Whittley Island farm boy, staged a big upset to win a technical knockout over Madison Dix, of Bellingham, new Pacific coast welterweight sensation. In the third main event bout, Wesley K. O. Ketchell, Salt Lake middleweight, knocked out Pat Yango, Los Angeles, in the second round of their scheduled six round bout.

Portillo substituted for "Doc" Smith, of Tacoma, when the latter was taken to a hospital with an attack of influenza.

Jumbo Davies, Victoria heavyweight, won a decision over Jackie Coston, of Seattle, and Johnny Hawkes, Seattle lightweight, defeated Eddie Volk, Portland.

Past Week Cool With Crops Of State Suffering

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29 (AP)—The summary of weather and crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending May 27, issued by the weather bureau, United States department of agriculture, said frost occurred in elevated districts several mornings and that the week, as a whole, had been cool.

In some of the small areas water for irrigation is scarce, the report said.

The crop report follows:

Cereals: Conditions have been generally favorable for small grains, but some winter wheat is very weedy and some fields are so heavy that lodging is feared. Some local damage was done by frost in elevated districts. Winter wheat is heading, except in the more elevated districts. The weather has been too cool for corn and some seed has rotted.

Fruits: Ripening of strawberries has been delayed by cool, cloudy weather, but in most cases growth has been satisfactory. It now appears that previous estimates of frost damage in the upper Hood River valley were too high. Vegetable temperature is causing uneven hatching of codling moths, necessitating frequent spraying. Early cherries will be ripe in some of the milder districts next week. There is some brown rot of prunes in Douglas county.

Meadows, pastures, and ranges: Hay crops have made good growth but need warmer weather. Alfalfa is being cut in most of the milder districts. Some alfalfa was damaged by frost in elevated districts. Vetch is beginning to bloom. Pastures are better than usual. Some rye has been cut for feed.

Live stock: Movement of stock to summer ranges continues. Shearing has been delayed by cool rain, but made considerable progress during the week. Turkeys have done well despite the cool weather.

Miscellaneous: Potatoes suffered local frost damage, but in most places are doing well. Conditions have been favorable for peas but beans need warmer weather. Raising of cantaloupes is under way in Douglas county. Flax is thriving.

Radio Commission Takes Case Under Adversement
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28 (AP)—The federal radio commission today had under advisement the question of revoking the license of station KVEP in Portland, Ore., over which Robert Gordon Duncan, self-styled "Oregon Wildcat," has been speaking. The hearing was concluded late yesterday with testimony of W. B. Scheffer, owner of the station. Protests that "shocking, indecent and obscene" language had been put on the air by Duncan resulted in the hearing.
