The new proposal would authorize the tariff commission to recommend increases or decreases in rates up to 50 per cent and the president could approve them or let them lapse by inaction.

The executive would not be required to disapprove a commission finding, if he saw fit, as was required under the original plan.

The conferences also eliminated that section which would have permitted a commission rate to become effective if the president neither approved nor disapproved it within sixty days.

The new plan follows closely the existing flexible tariff policy with a few minor additions taken from the house bill.

Debate on the proposition, as well as the tariff in general, is expected to start in the senate Monday.

North Supported Corbett

North, who was removed from the veterans' commission, was appointed by the late Governor Patterson to succeed W. C. Calhoun. When Norblad succeeded to the governorship, North submitted his resignation, but Norblad refused to accept it.

No Specific Statement

The governor did not make a specific statement of his reasons for the removal of Sawyer, but criticized him severely for his attitude toward the construction of the Roosevelt coast highway.

"I have never liked explanations," said a prepared statement by the governor. "In the conduct of this office any attempt at detailed explanation would be endless."

Butter, Poultry And Fish Drop In Oregon Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29 (AP)—Butter, poultry and fish prices declined today and when the descent was finished, the only product which had held its own was pork, which made a fractional advance of 1/2c.

All grades of butter declined, bringing extras down to 22c, a low mark for the year. Butterfat accompanied butter down with a similar reduction, making the delivered price Portland 20c.

The Portland produce company announced declines in poultry and fresh meats running from 1c to as high as 3c. Surplus supplies and light demand were cited as factors.

Egg prices were weak in the face of continued accumulation of receipts, but no official price changes were announced.

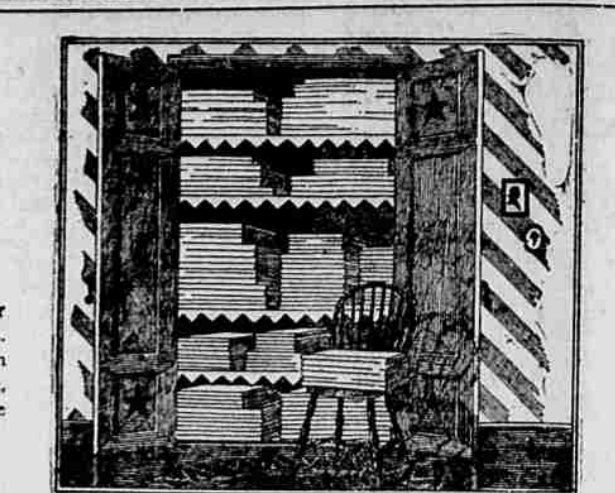
