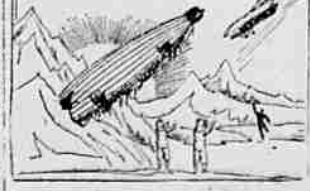

Baked Chicken and Giblet Gravy
Buttered Cauliflower

1 cup sliced tomatoes
1 cup sliced cucumbers
1-2 cup sliced radishes
2 tablespoons chopped onions
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers
1-2 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon pepper
1-3 cup French dressing
Mix ingredients, pour into bowl. Cover and chill. Serve on lettuce, top with salad dressing.
- Spring Fruit Pudding**
1 cup peeled sliced rhubarb
1 cup strawberries
1 cup sliced fresh pineapple
1 cup sliced peaches
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1-2 cup water or fruit juices
Mix sugar, flour and salt. Add fruit, lemon juice and water and pour into bottom of a buttered baking dish. Cover with batter.
