STARS THAT DON'T ROTATE BEAT LIKE HUGE HEARTS

WASHINGTON (AP)—A theory that certain stars do not rotate is presented to the American Association for the Advancement of Science by Dr. Ross Gunn of the Naval Research laboratory.

These non-spinning stars are those which pulsate, that is which expand and contract. Some of the pulsating stars have the habit of enlarging their diameters millions of miles. They beat like vast fiery hearts.

One class of pulsating stars, the Cepheid variables, are the "light-houses" of the sky, that is, enable astronomers to calculate the vast distances of space.

Dr. Gunn's theory comes from study of magnetic fields about stars, especially those about the pulsating sun. He says his conclusion "is in accord with the idea that Cepheid variables, being youthful giants, are so large that they would be unstable under rotation."

DURANT FOUR IS POPULAR MODEL

Car Introduced May 18
Plagues Public—Demand
Exceeds Deliveries.

The new Durant four model, introduced in this territory only a few days ago, is proving to be one of the most popular cars of the year, and orders locally are already ahead of the delivery schedule, according to the Peterson Durant garage. In Baker, the Peterson Motor company reports the same condition, with the demand very energetic.

Two models have been received here the first going to C. N. Cameron and the one on the floor being taken this morning by T. G. Johnson.

Complete description of the new cars have not been received, but Mr. Peterson declares that it is the best car obtainable in its price class. The wheelbase is 112 inches, the same as on larger cars, and many other features—including brakes—are on par with bigger machines.

In a recent statement in Oakland, the Durant Motor company president, Norman de Vaux said: "Up to the evening of May 20 we shipped from our western Durant plant 544 automobiles, or four more than we shipped in the entire month of April. Two hundred eleven of them were of our new four-cylinder car, regarding which our dealers have sent in some very enthusiastic reports since it was introduced May 18. They say that this car is selling readily and that it seems to meet a definite public demand."

"We are now shipping 26 cars a day and will advance that schedule next week when we put on additional men. Every car we can produce in May has been ordered and we now have in hand orders for 258 cars on our June schedule."
