Strawberry Crop Delayed By Wet Rains In State

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31 (AP)—The Oregon strawberry crop this year was estimated by the department of agriculture at 27,225,000 quarts on an area of 3450 acres, as against 24,700,000 quarts on 10,450 acres last year. The total United States crop is estimated at 279,350,000 quarts, compared with 227,182,000 quarts in 1929.

Cold, rainy weather since the Washington report was compiled has delayed ripening of the Oregon-Washington strawberry crop, said F. L. Kent, government regional statistician, in a strawberry crop report just issued. This has resulted in quality below normal. As the fruit has developed it becomes apparent that production in most districts will be even less than anticipated following the frost damage of early May. While size of fruit is perhaps larger than usual, a good many berries show decayed spots and many others have not colored properly.

A few frozen-pack establishments have started operations, but most operators state that the fruit had ripened so slowly and the fresh market has been so strong that not much barreling will be done before June 1, and some few plants may not start at all.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, May 31 (AP)—The Commercial bulletin of Boston said today: "There is a broader demand for wool in the eastern seaboard markets and prices are firmer, though not notably dearer this week. Demand favors chiefly the fine wools still but there is more demand for quarter and half-blood combing wools and some interest at length in three-eighths combing. Woolen wools still are rather slow."

"Buying is expanding in the west and rather more than half of the domestic clip is believed to have sold or consigned to date. Prices are showing a slight upward tendency in some sections of the west, with best fine staple clips coating around 70 cents, clean basis, landed in Boston."

"The foreign markets are generally firm this week. London closed today with merinos very firm and crossbreds a bit irregular at the close, owing to the English trade being less keen on account of the Yorkshire strike."

"Interest is keen in the final disposition of the tariff bill with trade consensus favoring passage early in June."

"More inquiry is reported for mohair at around 40 cents for original bag adult hair."

The Bulletin will publish the following quotations:
Scoured basis: Oregon, fine and f. m. staple 73-75; fine and f. m. Fr. Combing 70-72; fine and f. m. clothing 65-67; valley No. 2 62-63.
Mohair: Oregon, 35-40. Domestic grading, first combing 50-52, good carding 54-55.

will be the dirigible's eighth ocean crossing, it having crossed the Atlantic six times and the Pacific during its journey around the world last year, once. On this flight it has come from Germany to Spain, across Africa and the South Atlantic to Pernambuco and down to Rio Janeiro, and up to Lakehurst.

Damaged by Storm
Although no announcement was made of the fact by officers and passengers were apparently unaware of it, the dirigible Graf Zeppelin was damaged by storm during the flight from Pernambuco.

Making Repairs
Shortly after the airship was moored in the hangar workmen set up a ladder to the aft port engine gondola and it could be seen that some sort of repairs were in progress. By that time the German officers were all resting and could not be reached. Sailors stationed inside the ropes keeping

visitors and reporters from approaching too close to the ship, however, said that when the Graf arrived the two struts that hold the gondola away from the side of the bag were broken inside the nacelle and wired together. No one in authority could be found to confirm this, or to say how serious such an accident might be, but it was evident from the activity of the work that something in the engine car was being repaired.

Last night the ship passed through what Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible, characterized as the most severe squall he ever had experienced, but he said the ship weathered the storm all right and he made no mention of any damage.

Gasoline War On In Portland, Ore.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31 (AP)—In spite of recent price standardization of 2 1/2 cents a gallon for gasoline, a new "price war" broke out here today, and many service stations were selling motor fuel for 13 cents. During a drastic break in prices a month ago, gasoline sold as low as 12 1/2 cents a gallon. Disincentives of independent dealers to maintain prices established by company-owned stations is said to have caused the cut.
