LISBON, Portugal (AP)—Half a dozen six-foot Amazons will comprise Portugal's first corps of police women.

Soldiers Made Pets of Ornerly

Rattle Snakes, Nasty Scorpions

BOISE, Ida. (AP)—It was a time in 1916 when the old "First Idaho" was on the border doing a bit of patrol duty to keep the Mexicans from fighting their battles on American territory.

Colonel M. G. McConnell, adjutant general of the Idaho National Guard, continues to get a laugh out of the way the boys in the outfit fanned a hill full of rattle snakes, tarantulas and scorpions to make themselves a safe but not so safe camp.

The regiment moved into camp on a high place near Nogales, Arizona. It was the most acceptable camp in the vicinity but even it was studded with boulders all the way from the size of an egg to hunks of half a ton. The regiment turned in to clear them off.

Plenty of Snakes
What was the surprise and chagrin of the officers to find that every rock big enough to conceal one, concealed a rattle snake, mostly of the big Mexican diamond back variety. The smaller snakes, unable to rise to the dignity of shading of snakes, did their best at keeping tarantulas and scorpions from getting a too sunburned complexion.

But the work progressed. Gradually the rocks began to disappear from the camp site and with them the snakes and smaller poisoners. Not a soldier was bitten in the scuffle but the postal authorities and visiting officers and soldiers were driven to distraction.

The Idaho troopers, fearing that their zeal in removing the rocks and snakes would exterminate the species, at least from that vicinity, took to capturing them for souvenirs. At no time, said Colonel McConnell, has the American soldiers bent toward collecting souvenirs had such full and unusual sway. Every soldier had a row of bottles along the floor of his tent, each containing a tarantula or scorpion and several containing two or three.

So proud were they of their souvenirs that they shipped them home in pounds and cartons. So great were the shipments that the postoffice officials began an investigation and when they discovered the nature of the packages being sent home they put a ban on the business.

To load some poor mail carrier with a cargo of tarantulas, scorpions and occasionally a rattlesnake, all done up perhaps in a shoe box, was too much.

They Should Worry
But such regulations did not hinder soldiers. With snakes on their hands which they could not send to admiring folk back home, they took to staking them out at the corners of their tents.

It was no uncommon sight to see two or three big rattlesnakes tied to the corners of the tents, the colonel said. The big gey and black rattlers would be coiled around a tent peg, basking in the sun, tethered to a tent rope by a slender bit of light packing twine or a strand of thread—what-ever the soldier had.

Guard duty became a torment, for to wander off the path along the line of tents meant to be greeted by the menacing whirr of a rattler under foot. But as good things go, this one came to an end. A camp order confined all rattlesnakes, tarantulas and scorpions beyond the pale and with nothing else to do, the boys took to herding the Mexican bandits.
