## Health Talks

**NATURE'S DISINFECTANTS**  
Most of the communicable diseases are usually contracted through close personal contact. Few, if any, pass through the air in that mysterious fashion in which our forefathers believed miasmas traveled.

And one of the reasons why this is so is because nature has its own disinfectants which weaken and destroy germ life.

Chief among these disinfectants are sunlight, dryness and time. Sunlight is a great destroyer of germ life. Few microbes, especially those causing diseases, can survive in the bright sunlight for more than a few hours.

Dryness is another natural enemy to the many forms of minute life which beset mankind and threaten health.

The combination of sunlight and dryness often proves more effective agents than does fumigation.

Carpets, drapes, fabric materi-

als of various kinds which cannot be boiled, can be effectively disinfected by exposing them to the air and the effects of the sun. Sunlight and cleanliness are the foundations of modern sanitation. Sanitary cleanliness includes all that aesthetic cleanliness implies, and more.

One may appear as sweep for the sake of appearance but sanitary practice would require that the dusting and sweeping be done in such a fashion as not to stir up the dust and the infectious materials that go with it.

Sanitary cleanliness also includes removal of all matter subject to rotting or putrefaction, destruction of vermin and insects and the elimination of their feeding and breeding places.

By opening windows to allow the unobstructed sun to enter and to air the rooms, excellent use may be made of nature's disinfectant.

## Menus Of The Day

**By Mrs. Alexander George MEALS FOR SUMMER Breakfast**  
Chilled Diced Fresh Pineapple  
Ready Cooked Corn Cereal and Milk  
Buttered Toast and Coffee  
Luncheon  
Stuffed Egg Salad  
Bean Muffins Iced Tea  
Sugar Cookies Fresh Strawberries  
Dinner  
Sliced Cold Tongue  
Asparagus Salad  
Bread Butter  
Apple Pudding Coffee

**Stuffed Egg Salad**  
6 hard cooked eggs  
1/4 cup chopped celery  
1/4 cup chopped pimiento  
Stuffed olives  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
6 tablespoons salad dressing  
2 tablespoons finely chopped sweet pickles  
Cut eggs in halves and remove. Mash egg yolks. Mix celery, olives, salt, paprika and 2 tablespoons of dressing. Add egg yolks. Mix with fork and roughly stuff egg white cases. Arrange on lettuce and top with remaining dressing.  
(Serve hot or cold)

1 cup bran  
1 cup flour  
4 tablespoons sugar  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup molasses  
1 egg  
1/2 cup butter/milk  
2 tablespoons fat, melted.  
Mix ingredients and beat 3 minutes. Half fill greased muffin pans and bake 15 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with butter.

**Asparagus Salad**  
1 package lemon flavored gelatin  
1 1/2 cups boiling water  
1/2 cup diced celery  
1/2 cup sliced, cooked asparagus  
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento  
1 tablespoon finely chopped onions  
Pour boiling water over gelatin mixture. Stir until dissolved. Cool. Add other ingredients and pour into mold. Rinse out of cold water. Set in cold place. Unmold on lettuce and serve with salad dressing.

Apple pudding can be baked at same time as bran muffins so that kitchen need not be heated during preparation of evening meal.

Chilled, diced oranges mixed with pineapple and sprinkled with coconut makes a delicious dessert.

## DECLINES TO TESTIFY FOR LOBBY BOARD

(Continued from Page One)

"I call the attention of the committee to the letter, which at the beginning of the hearing I requested be placed in the record stating, 'If your committee desires any information concerning the work of our board, we shall be glad to appear before the committee and furnish such information.'"

"That letter specifically restricted the information proposed to be given. It did not intimate any purpose to give information concerning the personal activities of any one."

"While there are some matters connected with the Virginia anti-Smith campaign, especially the Jameson contributions and expenditures, concerning which I shall make a further statement to the press, yet as I see it, the issue involved in this matter of the assumption of the right of this committee to investigate my personal political activity is too vital to be compromised."

"If this committee, appointed to investigate lobbying, assumes the right to investigate my political activities as an individual in the anti-Smith campaign, then it can assume the right to investigate the activities of every individual citizen who votes or works in any political campaign pertaining to the election of national officers."

"Intolerable Intimidation"  
"I consider such an assumption of authority by any committee of the senate or of the house of representatives of the United States an intolerable infringement upon the rights of American citizens to entire freedom in their political activity, and seems to be intended as a threat to independent citizens against any repetition of the uprising of 1928."

"I am pleased to note that my interpretation of the jurisdiction of the committee is confirmed by a statement contained in the press this morning by the chairman of the committee, Senator T. H. Caraway."

## UPHOLDS CANNON

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Calling attention to the lobby committee's questioning of Bishop Cannon, Senator Heflin, Democrat, Alabama, told the senate today that "Protestant preachers are being subjected to humiliating cross-examination."

"The senate didn't authorize that committee to do that," said Heflin. "The committee is calling them about the 1928 campaign. What business is this of the committee? None. The committee has gone far afield."

He said officials of this board had "busted" they defeated the bill to create a department of education.
