NEW DESIGNS IN 1930 RADIO SETS

Remote Control Tuning, Similar Frills, Introduce New Season.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 31 (AP)—Such frills as remote control tuning, coupled with improved reproduction, will introduce the listener to a new season of radio reception.

That stress will be placed upon these factors, and that added attention is to be paid to the elaborateness of the console which contain the radio mechanism are indicated by the new apparatus to have its preview at the annual trade show and convention of the Radio Manufacturers' association here starting June 1. first serious consideration in set designing a year ago, apparently is to be one of the year's biggest talking points. By this method it is possible to tune the receiver, located in one room, from a control box attached to the set by a cable in another room. For example, if one is dining while the radio is playing, there is no need to leave the table if one desires to change the program. A button on the control box, conveniently placed, is pressed, and a new station is brought in.

For the first time in a trade show, home television sets and kits of parts are to be on display. Both complete receivers, including a combination short wave and television set, are expected to be included in the demonstration, which also will have scanning disks, motors and attendant apparatus for home assembly.

Another feature is expected to be the exhibit of auto radio sets. Receivers designed to be placed in all types of motor cars have been developed by numerous manufacturers.

Tone quality is to be given considerable attention, with improved amplifiers and dynamic speakers for bringing reproduction nearer to the ideal point. A number of models have tone controls on the panel, providing a means of changing the pitch to suit the listener. Automatic volume control through the use of an additional tube is being given wider use. There are also numerous combination phonograph and receiver models.

Probably next to tonal efficiency can be placed the appearance of the cabinet which houses the apparatus. Designers of furniture have kept step with the pace set in the past in their effort to make the radio set rival the beauty of any other piece of household equipment. Consoles with built-in speaker continue to predominate, with table model sets somewhat fewer in the background than a year ago.

Short wave sets are being given more attention this season. Several models are to be displayed. Screen grid tubes are still in the ascendancy, with that tube being the favorite for the tuning sections of the sets. While the pentode, both radio frequency and audio amplifier types, will be displayed as a commercial development, it is not expected to be included in any outstanding receiver model. The average number of tubes per set is eight, with three of them screen grids in most cases.

Although the price range of receivers is expected to be lower than a year ago, it will be about on the level with that of the past six months in line with the industry's effort to give "better radio per dollar."

Angora Museum Guards Relics Of Biblical Mystery

ANGORA, Turkey (AP)—American money and science are helping to make the new Angora ethnographical museum an important link in the chain of evidence that points to a nation that disappeared 4,000 years ago.

This uncompleted museum guards the hundreds of relics which the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago has been excavating in Asia Minor in an effort to solve the historical puzzle of the Hittites, a Biblical people known to have existed 3,000 years before the Christian era, but whose civilization and whose fate are hidden in undeciphered hieroglyphics. Under Dr. Van der Osten, the Oriental Institute will begin this spring its fourth year of field explorations in Alabir, near Angora. As in the past, the expedition will turn over to the Angora museum all its finds, and the museum, in turn, will present to the Americans any objects found in duplicates.

Funds for these explorations, which cost annually about \$50,000, are supplied by the General Education Board of New York, plus contributions made by such individuals as Mrs. W. Murray Crane, wife of the senator from Massachusetts; Henry J. Patten and

James A. Patton and Frank G. Logan of Chicago.

The Angora museum's chronologically arranged displays of relics render strikingly apparent the lasting influence of the lost race. The shapes and designs of Hittite implements are identical with Turkish implements of recent centuries. The Hittite double-headed eagle appears on Turkish silver snuff boxes, and the exact likeness of the Hittite goddess of Plenty appears on the Turkish amulet.

WELLS IN VAN OIL FIELD 100 PER CENT PRODUCERS

VAN, Texas (AP)—Oil wells in the Van field are 100 per cent producers.

The 32nd producing well out of 32 tests came in recently. The new well in this relatively new field was estimated unofficially as good for 8,000 barrels a day, but was choked down through a five-eighths inch line to an initial flow of about 1,200 barrels.

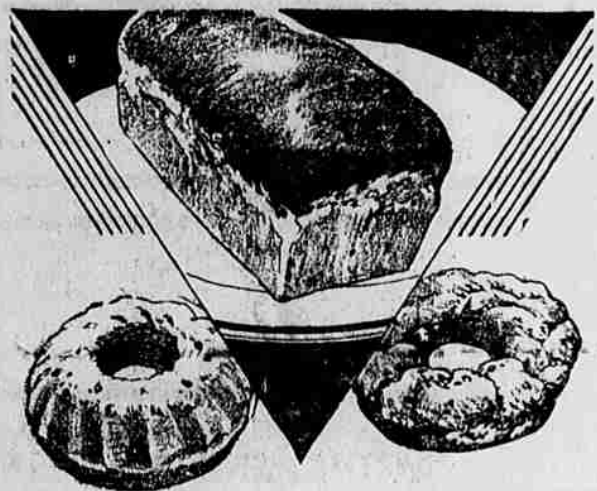
