Pineapple Meringue Cake - 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 4 egg yolks, 1/2 cup cake flour, 1/4 cup milk, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 2 tablespoons cake flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Mix in conventional cake method. Pour into 2 eight inch round pans.

Meringue - 4 egg whites, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat the egg whites till stiff. Fold in sugar and vanilla. Beat well. Spread the meringue over the batter in the pans. Sprinkle well with 1/2 cup chopped nut meats. Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees F. Cool. Turn out side down onto plate. Spread with filling. Put other layer on top, nut side up. Use the same filling.

Other Recipes - Russian Roll - 2 tablespoons gelatin, 1/4 cup cold water, 2 cups scalded milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3/4 cup sugar, 3 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup heavy cream, 1 angel food cake, Pecans, Marshmallows. Dissolve gelatin in the cold water. Add scalded milk, salt and sugar. Pour over very well beaten yolks. Beat. Cook in double boiler 10 minutes. Cool. When thickened, add vanilla and fold in whipped cream. Let stiffen. Split angel food cake that has been baked in a loaf pan or tube pan. Spread whipped cream mixture between cake and on top and sides. Decorate with pecans and marshmallow cherries.

overnight rolls by a different recipe than the one used last year. Some something new. Rather than trying to give a detailed account of Mrs. McLean's class in story form, in addition to the recipes themselves, pointers are culled each day from the lecture, which is believed, will give a better idea of the class, and the instruction given. In Wednesday's recipe for chocolate sauce the first line should have read: 1 square chocolate, or 2 lbs. g. chocolate. Recipe for yesterday's dinner were given as follows:

- Thursday, June 5 12 O'CLOCK BRUDAL BREAKFAST - Pink and Green Frozen Fruit Cocktail, Mint Sweetbread and Pine Olives Shortcake, Baked Bananas with Sun Preserves, Buttered Asparagus Tips, Green Pepper, Maraschino Salad, Pink Sandwiches, Meringue Pineapple Cake, Coffee, Suits, Candies.

Frozen Fruit Cocktail - 1 can fruit salad, 1 bottle gingerale, 1/2 lemon juice, Salt. Add the lemon juice to the can of fruit salad, add ginger ale and salt. Pour into refrigerator pan and freeze. To serve, scoop out in balls, using a french vegetable cutter. Allow to melt slightly. Top with sprig of mint.

Sweetbreads and Olive Shortcake for 6 - 3 tablespoons fat, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cup top milk, Salt, 1/2 cup minced ripe olives, 1 cup cubes cooked sweetbreads, Few drops onion juice. Make a white sauce of the fat, flour and milk. Season, add the sweetbreads, which have been par-boiled, skinned, cleaned and cut into cubes. Add the minced ripe olives. Keep hot in a double boiler till ready to serve.

Shortcake - 2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons shortening, 1 egg, 1/2 cup of water. Mix and sift dry ingredients. Work in the fat. Beat together egg and milk. With a knife, combine wet and dry ingredients. Pat out on floured board to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut with a large biscuit cutter. Bake on a sheet 12 minutes.

Baked Bananas - Select firm bananas. Peel. Split in half. For 6 bananas use 1/2 cup orange juice, 2 tablespoons melted butter. Salt the bananas. Place in a baking dish. Pour over sauce. Bake at 325 degrees F. 20 minutes. Baste with the sauce. Serve hot with or without strawberry preserves.

Green Pepper Maraschino Salad - Maraschino juice, 1 box lemon jello, 1/2 pint cottage cheese, Salt, 2 bell green peppers, 1 cup water brought to a boil to dissolve the jello. Cool. Cut a slice from the top of the peppers. Remove the seeds and fiber sections. Pour the jello into the peppers and set aside to cool. To serve cut 1/4 inch slices of pepper, spread one side with cottage cheese. May add chopped olives to the cottage cheese. Place cheese side down on lettuce leaf. Serve with mayonnaise.

Pink Sandwiches - Let Overnight Roll dough rise in a warm room. Turn out on a floured board and work in liquid red coloring. Knead thoroughly to prevent

streaks. Avoid too much color. Work into a loaf shape. Let rise in a greased loaf pan. Bake 60 minutes at 375 degrees F. When cold butter slices.

Green vegetables may be made much greener in the cooking process by the addition of a tiny bit of soda, while red vegetables may be made redder by adding a very little bit of vinegar.

In making the overnight rolls, add one-eighth teaspoon of pinnet to the dough. This heats the yeast and save considerable time in the process.

Cook cabbage in plenty of boiling water and for ten minutes, without using the lid.

In deep fat frying test the fat with small cubes of bread. If it is sufficiently hot, the bread cubes will brown in 60 seconds.

Pepper hash, easily made, should be made by every housewife. Mrs. McLean will send her recipe for this later.

Do not put meringue in a hot oven. It should not be over 225 degrees and 15 minutes should be allowed for baking.

Combine butter and brown sugar in equal parts, spread between two graham crackers and leave in a slow oven for 15 minutes. These are very tasty for the children and good in lunches.
