Justice Roberts Likes Lots Of Outdoor Life

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Owen J. Roberts, new supreme court justice, has been too busy with the law to develop any serious hobby. But he jumps on a horse and rides every time he gets a chance.
The Roberts have a town house here, a short walk from the city hall and business section, but in Chester county, near Birchrunville, about 30 miles from Philadelphia, they have a 100-acre farm. There they spend about two days of every week for rest and recreation.
"Owen rides over the whole place as often as he can," Mrs. Roberts related.
Roberts likes to be outdoors when he can. He is very fond of the woods and roughing it in camp. He is an expert with a canoe, too, having spent summers in Maine camps in his youth.
There are but three in the Roberts family. Their one child, Miss Elizabeth, is in her early twenties. She is abroad now; studying law, but will be home by the fall.
Known now as a lawyer of great ability, Roberts wanted to be a teacher when he was in "prep" school. He did not think lawyers in pursuing their profession could be honest, but after arguments by his father and advice from the headmaster of the academy, chose the profession which has led him to success.

COUNTY FAIR FUNDS GIVEN TO COUNTIES

SALEM, Ore., June 4 (AP)—The sum of \$58,249.44 in county fair funds was today apportioned among the 26 Oregon counties by the secretary of state for the maintenance of fairs this year.

The amount apportioned each county represents a tax levy of one-twentieth mill upon the taxable property of the county as last equalized by the state tax commission.

No county is allowed over \$16,500. Multnomah county is the only county where the levy exceeds that amount, and under the law the excess, which this year is \$295,56, is divided equally among the other counties.

The amount apportioned to the several counties are the following: Baker, \$125,51; Benton, \$24,22; Clatsop, \$23,13; Coos, \$14,13; Douglas, \$16,75; Jackson, \$16,68; Josephine, \$19,90; Klamath, \$18,98; Lane, \$27,17; Marion, \$27,15; Multnomah, \$16,500; Umatilla, \$24,43; Union, \$11,22; Walla Walla, \$58,86.

Milked Cow Under Fire Amid Gettysburg Fight

SPRINGVILLE, Iowa (AP)—Mrs. Mary Hindman, 82, of this place, milked the family cow on the bloody field of Gettysburg, with bullets whistling all around her.

Mrs. Hindman claims to be the only person now living who resided on that famous field during the battle. Her father, a loyal Union supporter, lived on the southern edge of the battlefield, where he had an orange farm.

By July, 1862, the opposing forces had converged on Gettysburg, Confederate troops overran the farm, but the family was not molested.

A distinguished appearing man called for a drink of water. It was General Lee. "He thumped me," she said, "and oh, he was a fine gentleman."

Mrs. Hindman was Mary Whisman, then, a wife of 16. She ran nearly a half mile through the gunfire, with bullets whizzing around her, to milk the cow. Later the family was forced to the attic by the firing and could not get to their well.

Her mother died from typhoid fever as a result of drinking the impure water they were forced to use. Orphaned, Mary came to Iowa to live with a aunt.
