NEWSPAPER READERS SCARCE IN BULGARIA

SOPIA (AP)—Newspaper reading is not exactly a habit in Bulgaria, judging from official figures on the circulation of dailies and weeklies.

In a population of 5,500,000 the total circulation averaged only 200,000 daily in 1929. This, however, is a big advance in twenty years as the circulation then was only 20,000 daily in Sofia with an additional 10,000 for all the provinces.

Only two newspapers have acquired circulations of 20,000 daily. They are non-partisan sheets and eschew party politics, the chief stock in trade of most of the other publications.

Advertising is extremely limited. The price to the reader is generally equivalent to half a cent in American money.
