OFFICE CAT

By Howard W. Blakelee (Associated Press Science Editor) CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—College men who seek adventure find it in a surprising field, anthropology, the once dry-as-dust study of historical remains.

Anthropology is tame no longer. It sends young men into jungles, deserts, polar ice fields, the lines between fighting tribesmen and among quarrelling mountaineers. It studies living men, and usually the fightingest kinds.

One such anthropological trek has just been finished in the mountains of Albania by Dr. C. S. Coon of Peabody museum, Harvard university, his wife, and Frederick Farnsworth.

One of their Albanian hosts, a head of the tribe of Dibra, learning that the anthropologist could shoot, introduced him to a parlor game with rifles. He would shout: "Long live America."

Coon then would shoot a clip of ammunition through the window. That done the American scholar would shout: "Long live Albania."

And the chieftain would shoot a clip through the window.

Asparagus and Cheese Salad for 6
 6 pieces lettuce,
 1 1/2 cups diced cooked or canned asparagus,
 1/2 cup Roquefort cheese,
 1/2 cup chopped celery,
 1 tablespoon chopped onion,
 4 tablespoons finely chopped sweet pickles,
 1/2 teaspoon salt,
 1/4 teaspoon paprika,
 1/2 cup French dressing,
 Cream cheese with fork. Add celery, onion, pickles, salt, paprika and French dressing. Chill. Pour over asparagus chilled and arranged on lettuce. Serve at once.

Custard Frozen (Suggested for mechanical refrigerator)

2-3 cups sugar,
 1-2 cup flour,
 3 eggs,
 3 cups milk,
 2 teaspoons vanilla,
 1/4 teaspoon salt,
 2 cups whipped cream.
 Blend sugar and flour. Add eggs and milk. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Beat 2 minutes and cool. Beat well and add other ingredients. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze 4 hours.
 This dessert can be frozen by packing in mold and burying in 2 parts chopped ice and 1 part coarse salt for 4 hours.

Rivers, Harbors Of U. S. Listed For \$39,580,000

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Altogether totaling \$39,580,000 for rivers and harbors works in all parts of the United States and insular possessions were approved Thursday by Secretary Hurley.

Altogether include, for Oregon: Coquille river, \$4,400; Coos Bay, \$482,000; Coos River, \$3,000; Umpqua river, \$100,000; Yaquina bay and harbor, \$24,000; Tillamook bay and bar, \$48,500; Columbia and lower Willamette rivers below Vancouver, Wash., and Portland \$432,400; Clatskanie river, \$4,000.

Willamette river above Portland and Yamhill river, Oregon, \$71,000; Snake river, Oregon, Washington and Idaho, \$6,000; Skamokawa Creek, Wash., \$200; Cowlitz river, Wash., \$18,500; Deep river, Wash., \$2,400; examinations, surveys and contingencies (general) Portland district \$13,000.

SALE BILL IS REMINDER OF DAYS OF OLD

Now comes another reminder of the "good old days."

It is an old sale bill reprinted in the May 29th copy of the Parsons (West Virginia) Advocate and sent to Mrs. Chris Miller, in La Grande.

One thing, however, remains about the same. The item winds up with the words: "Terms cash. I need the money."

The clipping, taken from an old newspaper, follows:

"An echo of the olden days is sounded in the following copy of an old sale bill, published in 1859 and advertising the property of Joe Cooley, who lived in the state of Kentucky, near the West Virginia line. The sale bill is now in the possession of Mrs. W. S. Smith, of Wayne, W. Va., through whose courtesy it is published herewith: "To whom it may concern:

"Having sold my farm and intending to move to Missouri, I will sell at public sale, one mill west and four miles south of Harrisburg, Ky., on Saturday, Sept. 25, 1859, the following property, to-wit:

"One black negro, 25 years old, weight 210 pounds; four negro wenches from 13 to 24 years old; three negro boys 6 years old; 12 hoes, 1 pine sled; 6 yoke oxen well broken; 10 ox yokes with hickory
