

PRIMO CARNERA BEATS CHRISTNER

Detroit Fight Goes Four Rounds Before Ambling Alp Kayos Opponent.

DETROIT, June 6 (AP)—Primo Carnera, "the ambling Alp," is one of the foremost among the heavyweight contenders today by reason of his impressive four round knockout victory over Mey-

er (KO) Christner, of Akron, Ohio, in Floyd Fitzsimmons' arena last night.

After a bad first round, in which Christner sent the crowd of 15,000 wild with a barrage of lefts and rights which the giant Italian could not ward off, Carnera began a systematic attack, directed principally at his opponent's head left eye.

He had the optic badly swollen at the end of the third and the blood, to flowing freely from a cut over it with a brace of left jabs in the early part of the fourth.

Then came a ponderous right to the chin, with one minute and thirty seconds to go, and the man known as Shackle, Risko and Knute Mason couldn't fall, went down.

Not until well after the count of 20 was he able to rise. Carnera outweighed the Akronite by 64 pounds, scaling 265 pounds, compared with Christner's meager 200, but it was the superior height and reach of the giant Italian which decided the match.

Time and again Carnera held Christner's arms' length and banged him with his free glove.

Christner fought gamely to the end. Aiming his blows high, he used both right and left to good advantage, several times making Primo sink perceptibly. Carnera remained calm throughout, however, absorbing punishment with smiles and smacking back at every opening.

Sixteen thousand spectators who paid \$75,000 to see Primo in action left satisfied that he can take and give.

Von Porat Agrees To Meet Stribling

CHICAGO, June 6 (AP)—Otto Von Porat, Norwegian heavy-weight, today surrendered to the demands of the Chicago stadium and agreed to meet W. L. "Young" Stribling in a 10 round match, June 18. Von Porat and his manager, Ed Stevenson, were suspended for six months by the Illinois state athletic commission yesterday for turning down the match.

JOCKEY SANDE IS SUFFERING FROM INJURIES

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—On the eve of one of the most important races of the season—the \$50,000 Belmont stakes—Earl Sande, famous jockey, today was suffering from minor injuries received in an automobile accident.

Sande was treated at the Jamaica hospital last night for laceration of the left cheek, nose and hand and later went to his home. It was believed the injuries would not keep him out of the Belmont stakes tomorrow when he is to ride Gallant Fox, the horse on which he won the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness.

Three other persons were injured in the accident in which three cars figured. Sande was in a machine with Edward Barnes, also a jockey, whose ribs were fractured. Henry L. Gross, a Brooklyn jeweler, suffered fracture of his kneecaps and Miss Betty Reifer, of Jamaica, Long Island, who was riding with Thaurys Jackson, of Hempstead, Long Island, received a possible fracture of the skull.

The accident occurred in Jamaica when a fire on the Gross automobile burst.

PORTLAND DUCKS NOSE OUT SACS

Oregon Entry in Coast League Takes Eight Out of Last 11 Games.

By The Associated Press The Portland Beavers registered their eighth victory in eleven games in a bang-up contest with the Sacs yesterday. Finding themselves trailing as a result of three Sacramento runs in the seventh, they came back for two each in the eighth and ninth to win, 4 to 3. Fullerton, for Portland, and Neil, for the Sacs, pitched stellar ball until the runs started coming in, when they were relieved by Cascarella and Gould, respectively.

San Francisco's Seals returned today to a Coast League first half season coast yesterday by turning the tables on the Missions, 8 to 7, while Los Angeles was throwing a real scare into the league leading Sacs by winning from Hollywood 13 to 4, and moving up to within a half game of first place.

The Seals decided that two straight losses to their neighbors, the Reds, were enough, and averaged a 7 to 1 Mission lead by knocking out five hits for seven runs and a victory in the seventh inning.

The Angels made it three straight over the Stars, opening by Fred Haney's homer with three on in the first inning, and never being headed throughout.

Seattle made it two out of three from Oakland, 6 to 2. Elmer Hanson pitched eight innings shut-out ball and Howard Hughes five, the longer stretch of the former being good for a Seattle win.

WILLAMETTE U. GIVES KEENE NEW CONTRACT

SALEM, Ore., June 6 (AP)—R. S. "Spec" Keene, for the past four years coach at Willamette university, will have charge of the athletic destinies of the institution for the next five years, according to an announcement made here Thursday by Dr. C. G. Doney, president of the university. The new contract calls for a substantial increase in salary.

The announcement of the retention of Coach Keene comes at the conclusion of one of the most successful years Willamette has ever had in major sports. Not only did the university win Northwest conference championships in football, basketball and baseball, but the teams in those sports did not lose a conference game, a feat never before equaled here.

Coach Keene took charge of Willamette's athletics in 1926 when affairs were at a low ebb. He built slowly and substantially, each year his teams winning greater success, his backers state.

M'Graw's Giants Make Sweep Of 3 - Game Series

This phenomenon has been remarkably evident in this season's games and all the more noticeable because of numerous recent trades.

The New York Giants, now composed to a considerable extent of former Cincinnati players, dispersed one great feat after another as they swept a three game series with the Reds. Lacking the perfect combination of having an ex-New York pitcher opposed to them, the Giants didn't do their best in this line as they won the final game yesterday, 7 to 4. But Hughie Critz, known as a light hitter before he came to New York, upheld the tradition by hitting a single and a home run and driving in two runs.

Robins Nose Out Win Glenn Wright, whom the Pittsburgh Pirates sent to Brooklyn in exchange for Jess Petty two seasons ago, returned to action against his old team yesterday and was instrumental in giving the Robins a 6 to 5 victory. Wright helped to drive Petty from the mound with a heavy batting attack that gave Brooklyn a good lead then played the key position in a first inning double play that ended the game when the Pirates seemed sure to tie the score.

The Chicago Cubs got along very well without two former Bostonians, Hornsby and Bell, as they wound up their series against the Braves with a 10 to 7 victory. It was the eighth in succession for the National League champions.

Jack Wilson's 17th home run was the best of Chicago's eleven hits. Philadelphia had homer No. 14 from the bat of Chuck Klein to add in a 10 to 4 triumph over the slumping St. Louis Cardinals.

Athletics Beaten The St. Louis representative of the American league, the Browns, had better luck with a ninth inning rally. Going into the ninth four runs behind the Philadelphia Athletics, they put on an uprising that called Jack Gahan into action as relief pitcher for the third successive day, scored five runs and won the game, 6 to 5.

Detroit's Tigers started their scoring early to keep the Washington Senators a game behind the Athletics. They put over four runs, off Sam Jones in the second inning and won by a 6 to 2 count.

Cleveland starting with nine runs in the first inning, scored early and late to beat the humble Boston Red Sox, 17 to 7. The Indians made 25 hits, one or more for every player, and drove Milton Gaston from the mound with six blows before the first man was put out.

DETROIT GOLF PLAYER WINS FRENCH TITLE LA BOULLE, France, June 6—(AP)—George Von Elm, of Detroit today won the French amateur golf championship, defeating R. G. Morrison, of England, nine up and eight to play, in the final 36 hole match.

Von Elm, former amateur champion of the United States, was the outstanding favorite from the opening of the championship. In the final match he never was in danger, finishing the first 18 holes with an advantage of five holes over his opponent. The American played the 18 holes of the morning round in 79 strokes.

The Detroit's victory marked the second American triumph in two years in the French golf competition. Last year the title was won by Jack Westland, of Chicago, who did not defend it.

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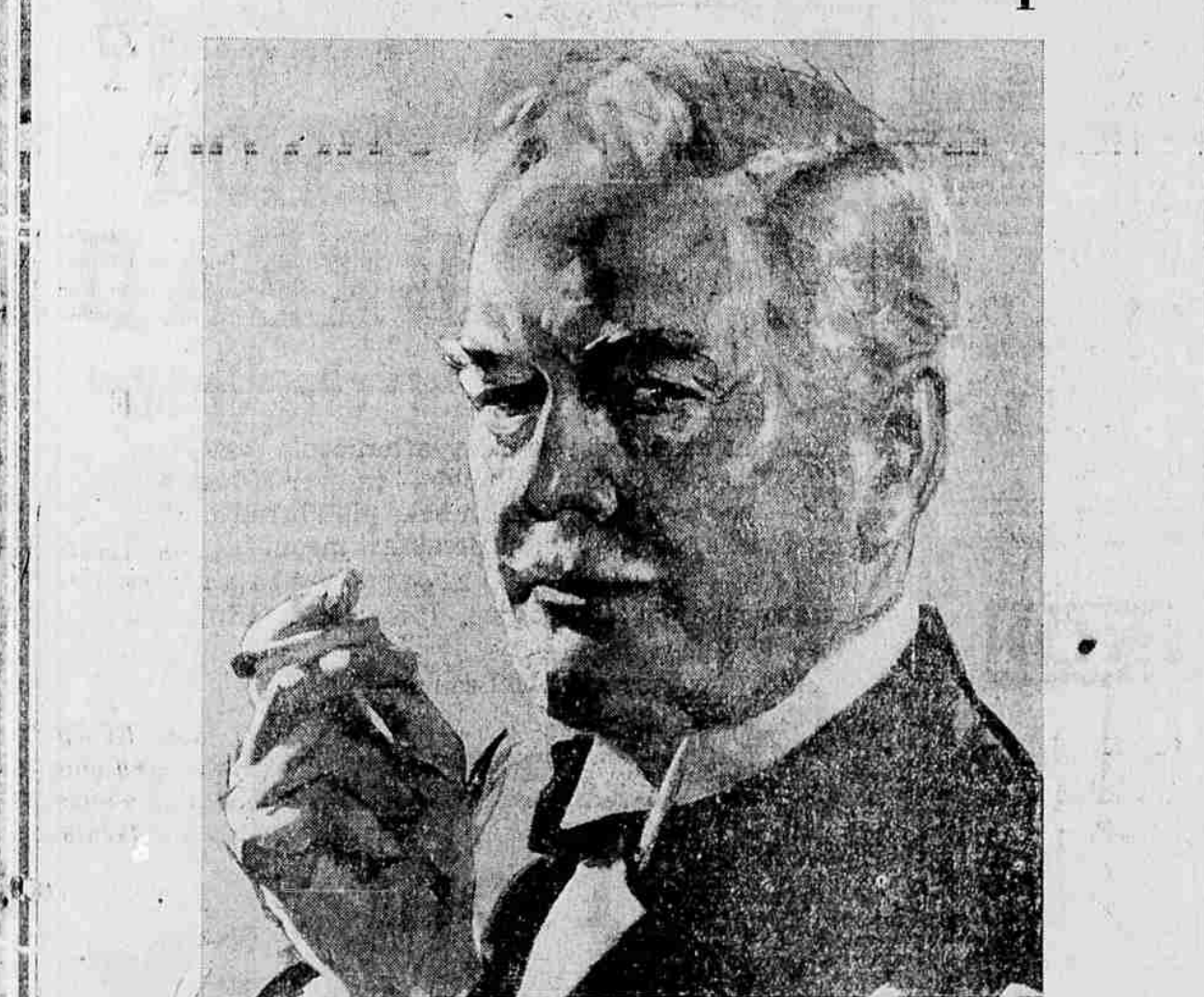
