Miss Helene Price Given High Honor At Willamette U.

Miss Helene Price, of La Grande, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter S. Price and a graduate this year from Willamette university, at Salem, was on Tuesday, announced as being the recipient of the Theodore Dresser scholarship. This scholarship was made possible by the Philadelphia Music company early in the year and carries a monetary award for the student who receives it. The student must be an outstanding student in music and also in liberal arts, and the recognition given Miss Price, the first time in the history of Willamette university, is one which her friends are confident she has well merited.

The announcement, which came as a distinct surprise to Miss Price, was made midway in the program of her senior piano recital, last Tuesday evening and was made by Miss Frances Virginia Melton, director of the piano department of Willamette. The recital was given in Walker hall, and was enjoyed by a very large company of people, not the least interested being Miss Price's mother, who went from La Grande for the event.
