Coupe Is Added To Chrysler Six Line This Week

The addition of a convertible coupe with rumble seat to the new low-priced Chrysler Six line has been announced this week by the Chrysler Sales Corporation. The car, selling at a factory price of \$225, brings the total models in this series to six body types, offered at \$275 up, the lowest-price range that Chrysler has ever offered on a six-cylinder car. The convertible coupe has standard equipment. Wire wheels with spurs in the front fender wells are available at additional cost.

The convertible coupe combines the seasonal advantages of a roadster with those of a coupe. The top folds back completely for open driving, and can be quickly and easily adjusted for closed car driving in unfavorable weather. Chromium plated frames for the door glass afford a smart appearance when the top is back and the door is up.

Finished in attractive color combinations with contrasting panels and striping, the car presents a striking appearance with its graceful, full body lines. The seat cushions are upholstered in heavy tan leather, both in the driver's compartment and rumble seat. Rubberized pile fabric, matching the top, is available as special equipment for upholstery at slight extra cost. All exterior hardware of the car is chromium-plated.

The car is powered with a 62-horsepower engine that has already proved its high performance standards in thousands of Chrysler Sixes now in owners' hands. The engine has a bore of 3 1/2 inches and a stroke of 4 1/2 inches with a displacement of 196.6 cubic inches. The compression ratio is 5.2 to 1.

The seat of the convertible coupe is adjustable, and provides ample room for two or three passengers. Convenience and completeness are provided for the driver. Grouped in a panel indirectly illuminated, are speedometer, ammeter, oil pressure gauge, and electric fuel gauge. Carburetor choke and theft lock ignition switch are within easy reach. On top of the three spoke steering wheel are the light control switch, gasoline throttle and horn button. Spark control is entirely automatic. Gear shift is standard, three speeds forward and one reverse. The hand brake controls the drive shaft, while the steering wheel of the Chrysler weatherproof, internal-expanding four-wheel hydraulic type, affording safety at all driving speeds.

Other features offered as standard equipment include four hydraulic shock absorbers, fuel pump, rubber insulated frame and engine, and the henderite, rust-proofing process on all enameled parts.

"Caterpillar" Is Time Saver For Harvest, Claim

Harvest days are the most valuable in the farm year. The year's work is at stake—every day, every hour, minute, that the crop remains uncut, unthreshed and away from the bin adds risk to the profits on the minutes.

Population Of Los Angeles Is Now 1,121,730

LOS ANGELES, June 7 (AP)—Showing what is believed to be the largest growth of any city of major size in the United States, Los Angeles today awoke, to find itself among the first five cities of the nation with an official population of 1,121,730, an increase of 655,957 or 113.59 per cent over the 1920 figures, while metropolitan Los Angeles showed a phenomenal growth during the ten years since the 1920 census, greater still was the increase of 1,263,192, or 134.88 per cent, which brought the 1920 population of Los Angeles county to 2,199,567.

The three next largest cities on the Pacific coast are San Francisco, 625,974; Seattle 362,426; and Portland 299,123.

Based on available figures, Los Angeles now ranks 19th in population among the cities of the world.

On the basis of the greatly increased population Los Angeles county is entitled to elect instead of the present two United States congressmen.

EGYPTIANS STUDY PILING BERLIN (AP)—EGYPT, whose archives in Pharaonic times were the wonder of the world, has sent two young officials to the Prussian Record Office to learn modern methods of filing and registering, with the object of remodeling the Egyptian state archives.

RIO POLICE IN DRIVE AGAINST PISTOL TOTTING

RIO JANEIRO (AP)—Following the death of a Brazilian army colonel, who was shot by a man whom he accidentally jostled at a busy street corner, police of this city undertook an intensive drive to enforce laws against pistol toting. The colonel was unarmed.

Police records show that in April alone 224 concealed weapons were confiscated as compared with 438 in the whole of 1929.

To preserve order in the federal district of 1,500,000 people, there are 5,000 military police and 2,500 civil police. The former are organized as infantry and cavalry, the mounted men doing the night patrolling.

Bill To Benefit Lumber Industry

PORTLAND, June 7 (AP)—W. H. Gibbons, head of the forest products office, under P. J. Buck, regional forester, states that President Hoover's approval of a bill for appropriation of \$25,000 for surveying pulp and paper potentialities indicated the coast would benefit.
