Advisory Board Meeting Under Way In Spokane

Spokane, Wash., June 9 (AP)—Nearly 700 men in some way connected with shipping, connected their efforts Saturday to find out what is wrong with industry and why. They were attending the quarterly conference of the Pacific Northwest Advisory Board of the American Railway Association.

At a series of meetings Friday spokesmen told their business associates in a slum room, was merely returning to a normal level after furries in heights that could not be maintained during the last two years. Car loadings in the northwest, although lower now than for preceding years at this time, seemed due for an increase, they were told.

H. M. Adams, president of the Western Pacific railroad, said that freight business as measured by ton miles was 3.1 per cent greater in 1929 than it was in 1928, that more men were employed by railroads of the country, and that wages are slightly higher.

Through adoption of efficiency methods, heavier freight car loadings and longer trains, operating costs had been decreased and operating profits increased, Adams said.

H. J. Stephens, a prominent northwest grain dealer, reported that a recent survey indicated that the grain industry in the Inland Empire was brightened by recent rains, and that normal crops might be expected.

To Investigate Mysterious SOS

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—The federal radio commission asked the commerce department radio division today to investigate the SOS messages which disrupted a chain broadcast Saturday night by former Senator James A. Reed, of Missouri.

W. M. Powell, chief of the division, was asked to make a complete survey through the department's supervisors at Baltimore and New York. He is to ascertain which broadcasting stations closed down and the origin of the SOS if possible.

The radio net provides a maximum punishment of \$5,000, fine or a five-year prison term or both for circulating a fraudulent SOS. Reed's speech was being broadcast from Sedalia, Missouri, and the interruption came as he was denouncing what he termed the "radio trust."

AUSTRALIAN FINANCIER CUTS SALARY TO \$5,000

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—W. J. Cleary, new chief commissioner of New South Wales government railroads, says \$5,000 a year net is enough for anyone.

Regarded here as a financial genius, Cleary resigned as director of a big brewery to set the languishing state railroads in order.

He was offered \$37,500 a year, but would only accept \$25,000. Now he has reduced this to \$12,500, but income taxes, assessed on his nominal salary of \$25,000, amounts to \$7,500, so Cleary will net only \$5,000.

LOME, Togo, Africa (AP)—The French medical authorities, planning an exhibit for the colonial exposition at Paris next year, found that modern medicine is putting African witch doctors out of business and will visualize this triumph of science over superstition in the Togo display.
