## Moderate Drinking Not Sinful, Bell

CHICAGO, June 12 (AP)—The Rev. Dr. Bernard Iddings Bell, New York educator, says in the current number of the diocese of Chicago Episcopal church magazine: "I do not believe that moderate drinking is in itself sinful."

He does not believe moderate drinking on the part of college students should be condemned by educators. The writer is the warden of St. Stephen's college, controlled by the Episcopal church but affiliated with Columbia university.  
 "I am not myself concerned about the drinking problem with our own students," he said.  
 In conclusion, he says only a small minority of students seem to favor enforcement of the prohibition laws. It is doubtless true that a majority of students drink occasionally and some of them drink frequently.
