Menus Of The Day

FISH FOR FRIDAY
Salmon a la King with Peas
Buttered Toast
Potato Chips
Buttered Turnips
Bread
Peach Conserve
Plum Cobbler
Lemon Sauce
Coffee

Salmon a la King with Peas (Serving 6)
5 tablespoons butter,
6 tablespoons flour,
3 cups milk,
2-3 teaspoon salt,
1-4 teaspoon pepper,
4 tablespoons cooked celery,

2 tablespoons cooked green peppers,
1 cup salmon,
1 cup cooked peas,
2 eggs, well beaten,
2 tablespoons chopped parsley,
Melt butter and add flour. Blend well and add milk and cook until a creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients. Cook slowly and stir constantly for 2 minutes. Serve on the toast.

Peach Conserve

4 cups sliced fresh or canned peaches,
1 cup diced pineapple,
4 tablespoons lemon juice,
4 tablespoons orange juice,
1 teaspoon cinnamon,
5 cups sugar,
Mix the ingredients and let stand for 1 hour. Cook slowly until thick. Pour into sterilized glasses and seal when cool.

Plum Cobbler

3 cups seeded red or blue plums,
1 cup sugar,
2 tablespoons flour,
1-2 cup water,
1 tablespoon lemon juice,
1-2 teaspoon nutmeg,
2 tablespoons butter,
Mix the sugar and flour. Add the rest of the ingredients and pour into a shallow, buttered baking dish (glass suggested). Cover with the dough.

Dough

2 cups flour,
4 teaspoons baking powder,
1 tablespoon sugar,
1-2 teaspoon salt,
3 tablespoons fat,
1 egg,
1 cup milk,
Mix the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Cut in fat with knife. Add rest of ingredients and

spread soft dough over top of plum mixture. Make 4 holes in top to allow steam of escape. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Turn out upside down and serve warm.
Lemon Sauce
2-3 cup sugar,
2 tablespoons flour,
4 tablespoons lemon juice,
1-2 cups water,
1-8 teaspoon salt,
2 tablespoons butter,
Blend the sugar and flour. Add the rest of the ingredients and cook until a little thick.

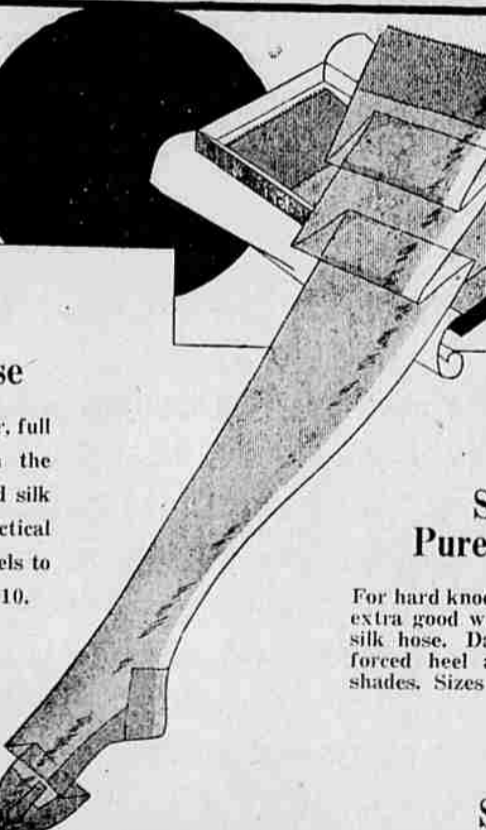

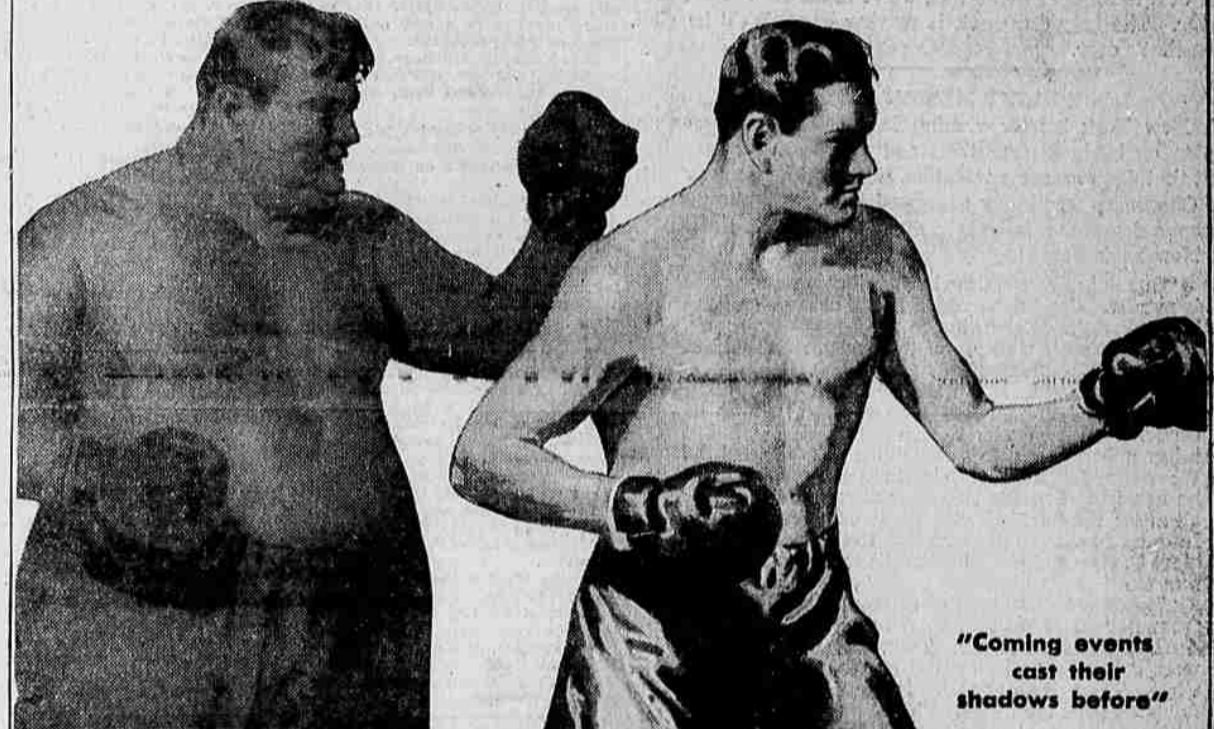
