

## STOCK SHOW CLOSING AT UNION TODAY

Judging Near End on Finest Array of Livestock in Show's History.

### EDVALSON, MILLS, HUNTER REWARDED

Championships Announced in Some Classes—Effects of Thursday's Accident Felt.

With by far the finest array of livestock exhibits in many years, if ever, with ideal weather conditions, something unusual, but with the smallest crowds, the 22nd annual Eastern Oregon livestock show is drawing to a close this afternoon at Union. Today's crowd is not as large as it should be, officials state, and yesterday's crowd which is usually the big day of the show, fell about \$1000 short in gate receipts according to reports this morning.

In many ways this year's show exceeds those of several years. Horses have come back this year. This interest in the six-horse teams has been keen and stimulated interest in all the classes of horses. Competition in this field has been close and according to the official judges their task has been a hard one.

More Different Breeds  
More different breeds are being shown this year in the dairy and beef cattle divisions, and fine Jersey, Holsteins, Ayrshires, Guernseys, Herefords and Brown Swisses have come in from all over Eastern Oregon. Hogs are not so prominent in numbers this year.

The Future Farmers of America, the boys who are doing work in Smith-Hughes departments in high school, have been present this year in larger numbers and their work has been better organized. Every chapter in Eastern Oregon is represented—Timber, Union, Enterprise, Wallawa, Halfway and Ontario.

More 4-H club boys and girls are present this year than ever and their exhibits have been one of the big factors in the success of the show. Sheep are gaining in the 4-H exhibits, 63 head having been shown by the Timber club alone.

Judging Continues  
The great gain in interest of livestock have made the judging unusually heavy and many classes were yet to be judged today. The open class in Jerseys and Holsteins was finished this morning with honors somewhat divided. Jimmie Mills, of the Cove, showed a registered Jersey bull which carried off the grand championship in the breed. E. K. Hunter, of Wallawa, with his fine entries carried off the senior and grand championships in cows.

C. P. Edvalson, of Catherine Creek, showed his head sire, Phynere King Korydyk, No. 514988 this year and this morning the judges named this sire as senior champion bull of that class. An interesting fact about this animal is that he is the calf which Mr. Edvalson won three years ago on the best grade Holstein shown, the calf having been awarded by Dr. Wiley. The animal is now something over three years old and walked away with the first honors, much to the gratification of Mr. Edvalson.

## National Army Beaten Back By Chinese Rebels

Retreating Toward Wu-chang, a Walled City—Military Officers Conscript Coolies.

HANKOW, June 14 (AP)—The nationalist government army suffered reverses today and was unable to stem the Kwangsi province rebels advance toward Wu-chang opposite this city on the Yangtze river, said unconfirmed dispatches from the battle field 40 miles south of Wu-chang.

The nationalists were reported retreating toward Wu-chang, a walled city of 600,000 inhabitants. The government military officers in Hankow began conscripting coolies, taking them to the southern environs of Wu-chang, where they were forced to dig trenches and construct other defensive work.

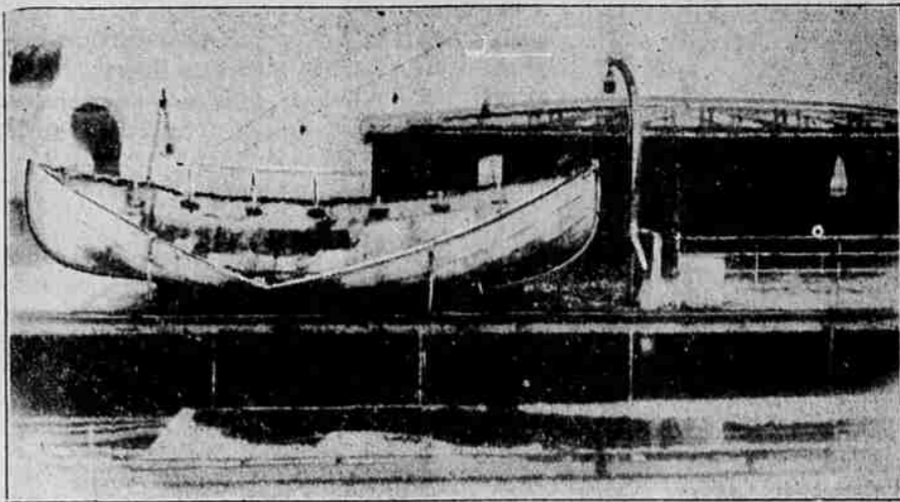
