French Medics Down Tze-Tze Fly In Africa

AYOS, Cameroon, Central Africa (AP)—The tze-tze fly, carrier of the terrible sleeping sickness germ, has been fought to a standstill by a little group of doctors who are given credit for saving hundreds of thousands of lives in this French mandated territory.

The Jamioi, former chief of the Pasteur institute at Brazzaville in the French Congo, for several years has worked with such success that he feels sleeping sickness mortality has been reduced to what might be called normal proportions for this country. His aim now is to stamp it out.

When France, after the war, took over this German colony, sleeping sickness was spreading and in one district there were 200,000 deaths. In another district of 40,000 square miles, there still are 350,000 persons affected.

Dr. Jamioi, with a group of young French doctors, has trained a native staff so that the white man's capacity is multiplied many times. A school to train natives to fight the disease, furnishes men and women skilled in the several simple things needed to be done.

The French doctors diagnose the disease as the natives file by them and, with chalk, mark on the natives' chests the treatment to be given. Those who come from distant villages, after preliminary injections, return to their homes, where trained natives continue the treatment.

The microscope plays a big part in the work and a dozen natives have been trained to operate the instrument.

Faith in the foreign doctors' ability has grown until now thousands of affected persons come from afar, some of them carried

INN KEEPERS DESERT SOUTH FRANCE RESORTS

PARIS (AP)—An exodus of small inn keepers and merchants from the Riviera is indicative of a transformation in the vacation resorts of Southern France.

Several successive bad seasons on the Riviera, caused by what seems definite indifference of the weathermen toward that long favored region, have driven the smaller hotel keepers to other sections.

One of the best favored in this change is the Touraine country through which flows the Loire river. The weather is mild the year around and on the Paris-Bordeaux highway small taverns are springing up much as they used to exist from Marseilles to Monte Carlo.

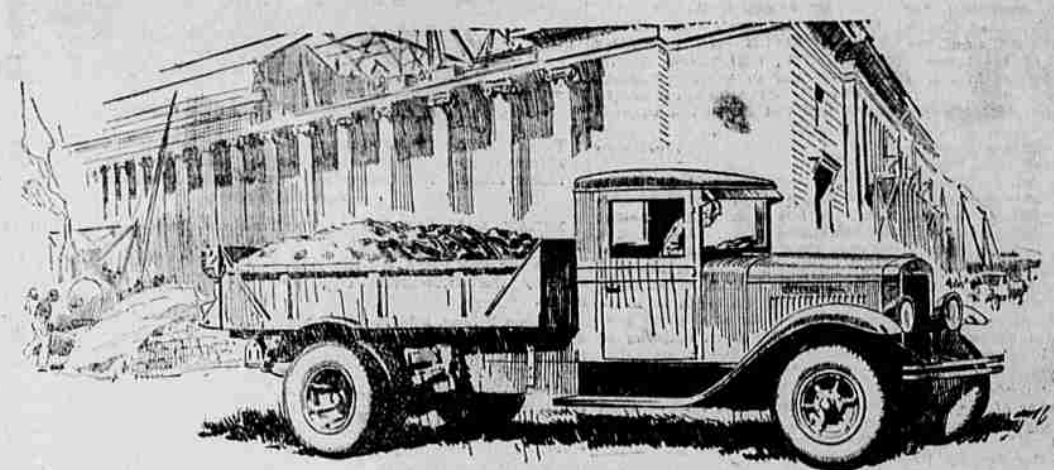
