TWINE LEADING GOLF QUALIFIERS

Jones, Diegel, Moe, Barnes and Other Americans Make the Grade.

HOVELAKE, England, June 15 (AP)—W. T. Twine, of Bromley, British pro, took the lead in the first qualifying round of the British open golf championship today by scoring 68 over the Wallasey course. Until Twine returned to the 18th hole, he had a score of 34 out and 34 in. Jones, Diegel, American pro, and Jimmy Broadbent, veteran London pro, were tied for the lead at 69. Diegel's play being over the royal Liverpool course and Broadbent at Wallasey.

Diegel, P. G. A. champion of the United States and open champion of Canada, equalled the course record of the Royal Liverpool club with a brilliant 70. Diegel, out in 25, came home with a sensational 45, scoring an eagle and birdie on two of the last three holes.

Diegel used a brassie from the tee throughout the round, changing to his usual high tee. His putting was excellent and he finished with a putting flourish when he holed a long one for a birdie at the home hole.

532-Yard Hole in Three
At the sixteenth, 532 yards and the longest hole on the course, he played an iron dead to the pin and holed the putt for an eagle.

George Von Elm, scored 71 over Wallasey and Bobby Jones 74 at the Royal Liverpool.

Mack Seymour, St. Leonard's, had a score of 71 at Wallasey but withdrew from play when informed of the sudden death of his father while he was playing his round.

"Home Moe, youthful Oregonian, had 75, and Jim Barnes and Macdonald Smith were tied at 77. Moe was in trouble all the way through his first nine holes but straightened out his game to come home in 35 strokes. He took 39 yards past Temple and nearly

on the first nine. His score was five over par of 70 but ranked well up with the early returns.

Weather Perfect
Play began at nine o'clock this morning under almost perfect weather conditions. There was an offshore breeze just stiff enough to make the players careful. The wind made the numerous out of bounds risks on the outward route less dangerous.

Jim Barnes, veteran pro, was the first American out on the Hoylake course and Don Moe, of Portland Ore, was first at Wallasey, the latter being paired with K. H. Temple, of London.

"What a picture!" exclaimed an English flapper in the gallery as handsome young Don Moe stepped to the first tee. Moe was perfectly attired in a sartorial golfing synonym with blue pull over and pearl grey plus fours.

Perfect Drive
Moe's first drive also was a picture of perfection. His first error was the topping of his second shot at the second hole. Then he took three from the edge of the green. He topped his second shot at the fifth also, the ball plunking into a bunker.

He missed a four-footer at the short sixth after a neat chip shot. He pulled his drive at the seventh but played a grand second shot and got his four. He missed another four footer on the eighth green and was short with his second at the ninth where he had another five.

Moe pulled his drive into a leather slump at the short eleventh. He moved the ball a yard but played the next shot dead and smiled as he holed out. He missed a four footer at the eleventh.

Moe Recovers
After the eleventh, Moe recovered his putting touch. He holed a four yarder at the fourteenth, made a great recovery at the short seventeenth after his tee shot found a ravine. He was out driving Temple, his playing partner, although the Briton is considered to be one of the longest drivers among the youthful amateurs.

At the thirteenth Moe hit such a long drive that he was eighty yards past Temple and nearly

SEATTLE BEATS PORTLAND TWICE
Ducks Enjoy one Day out of Cellar and Tribe Rises in Rebellion.

Sacramento and Seattle were the winners in yesterday's eight games closing the tenth week of the first half Pacific coast league baseball season. The Senators took two games from Oakland 2 to 3 and 5 to 4, maintaining a firm hold on first place, and the Indians, downing Portland twice, 3 to 0 and 7 to 4, climbed out of the cellar where they had been for a day.

Tony Freitas got revenge for Wednesday's defeat by trimming the Oaks in the morning contest at Stockton. Howard Craighead took further punishment at the hands of the league leaders in the afternoon at Sacramento, when he lost a see-saw affair due to a ninth inning rally which gave the Senators the tying and winning runs.

San Francisco ended the week in second place, clinching its series with Los Angeles by taking the second game yesterday, 10 to 5, after losing the opener 4 to 5. The Seals started the scoring in the first of the initial game, with Elmer Jacobs on the mound, but were soon headed, Clyde Barfoot hurling consistently good ball throughout for the Angels. In the seventh inning nightcap the Seals started their heavy hitting by driving Walsh out in the first, and collected a total of 15 hits, four homers, off Walsh, Yerkes and Gabley. Shely connected for his circuit twice. Curt Davis was the winning pitcher.

Home runs were plentiful as the Missions took the odd game of their series with Hollywood by winning the morning contest, 15 to 4, although they dropped the afternoon game 8 to 13. The Reds backed Lieber well in the morning to ruin the hopes of Hollersan and Wetzel, Hollywood hurlers, Boone getting two homers. In the afternoon Harold, first baseman for the Stars, knocked three homers to make a total of four for the day, and Monroe eluded three for the Reds. Caster, on the mound for the Missions, knocked a four bagger in the second inning, and the Stars retaliated by knocking him out of the box in the fourth. Johns was relieved by Yde in the seventh but got credit for the win.

Seattle profited by the three-hour pitching of "Dutch" Ruether in their first game with Portland, and the Ducks were shut out as Mails yielded three runs. Portland ended with a one game margin in the week's series although they lost both yesterday's games. The Ducks rallied for one tallies in the last two periods of the seven inning game, but the Indians had already battered Casarella for enough to win.

African "Monkey Bread"
Monkey bread is also known as bonob, adansonia and diglita. It comes from Africa, and grows on trees that usually stand from 40 to 70 feet high. Monkey bread is an oblong, heavily scaly, growing from 7 inches to 18 inches in length. The fruit is considered to have some medicinal properties, and is used in treating tropical fever. The ashes and bark are frequently boiled in rain water and used as a kind of soap by the natives.

Color in the Sea
The most beautiful of tropical sea-follies is the moonfish, often called the glassfish because of its pearly form of a silver color. The angelfish is as gaily colored as the rainbow and with trailing fins of contrasting tints. The squirrelfish flaunts a deep coral shade and great dark eyes. The parrotfish attracts attention as much by its gorgeous colorings of turquoise blue, plum, purple or bright green as by the peevish lony look.

"Fast" Mail Carrying
The famous "pony express" established in 1830 to carry mail between St. Joseph, Mo., and California, required 80 riders and between 400 and 500 horses. The quickest trip ever made was the dispatching of President Lincoln's inaugural address over the route to Sacramento, Calif., the 1,600 miles being covered in 7 days and 17 hours.
