## HOLLAND TO BE LINKED BY AIR WITH EAST INDIES

THE HAGUE (AP)—Fortnightly flights between the Netherlands and the Netherland East Indies is to begin October 1, permission to fly over India having been granted by the British government.

Heavy planes accommodating 20 passengers and a cargo of mail will be used. Ten planes are to be in operation by May, 1932, in weekly service.

**Eggs A La King**  
4 tablespoons butter,  
4 tablespoons flour,  
2 cups milk,  
1-2 teaspoon salt,  
1-4 teaspoon paprika,  
2 hard cooked eggs, sliced,  
1-2 cup cooked peas,  
5 eggs, well beaten or 2 cups milk.

Get the butter and add the flour. Blend and add the milk. Cook until a creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add the rest of the ingredients and cook for 1 minute. Serve on hot, buttered toast.

**Sugar Cookies for Summer**  
1-2 cup hard,  
1-2 cup butter,  
2 cups sugar,  
4 tablespoons cream,  
2 eggs,  
1 teaspoon vanilla,  
1 teaspoon lemon extract,  
1 teaspoon nutmeg,  
1-2 teaspoon salt,  
4 cups flour,  
1 teaspoon cream of tartar.

Cream the fat and butter. Add the sugar and mix until creamy. Add the cream and eggs and beat for 2 minutes. Add the rest of the ingredients and chill. Break off 1/2 of the dough and flatten down 4 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes in a moderate oven.

**Chilled Fruit Compote**  
1 cup sliced fresh pineapple,  
1 cup diced oranges,  
1 cup diced grapefruit,  
1-2 cup sugar,  
2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Mix and chill the ingredients for 2 hours or longer. Serve in glasses.
