

JONES LEADING HOYLAKE FIELD

Par Today Brings Score to 142 — Horton Smith Chalks up a 145.

HOYLAKE, Eng., June 19 (AP)—Hobby Jones scored a par 72 in his second round of the British open golf championship and led the field with a two-day score of 142.

Jones, after a shaky start, came home brilliantly, covering the last nine holes in 35 strokes.

He displaced Horton Smith from the leadership when he posted his score, the tall Missouri pro having scored 145 in two days to lead the field in mid-afternoon.

Leo Diegel played his second round in 73 strokes and joined Archie Compston and Mac Smith with a total score of 147.

Jim Barnes, who had 148, was close to the leaders.

MacDonald Smith and Archie Compston were tied at 147 for the first two rounds of the British open golf championship as the early finishers posted their scores this morning.

Smith added 27 to his 79 of yesterday, while Compston attached a score of 73 to a first round 74.

F. C. Stevens Jr., Los Angeles, scored 78 in the second round for a 36 hole total of 158.

Cotton Ships
Henry Cotton, one of the three leaders at the beginning of the day's play, slipped back to 79 and had a score of 149 to show for his two days' efforts.

Mac Smith was troubled today as was Jones yesterday with long putts just slipping past the cup or hanging on the edge. At half a dozen holes his putts seemed to be about to drop but remained out.

Hobby Jones again started with a five at the par four first hole. The iron was pulled and his chip short, leaving him a long putt. The ball just twisted out of the cup as he putted for the four.

At the second hole his putt from 15 feet for a birdie three hung on the lip of the cup and he took a par four.

Jones, as usual, was accompanied by a great gallery. The crowd watching his play was estimated at 5,000.

Frank Dolp, defending champion, Johnny Robbins and Eddie Hogan, of Portland; Forest Watson, Alex Duncan and Ed Greenway, of Seattle and Freddie Wood and Monty Hill, of Vancouver, survived the second round of play yesterday in the men's championship at the Vancouver golf club.

In the second round of the women's tournament at the Shaughnessy club, Mrs. S. C. Sweeney, Miss K. Farrell and Mrs. Vera Hutchings, defending titlist, of Vancouver; Mrs. A. H. Parkhurst and her daughter, Angie Parkhurst, of Los Angeles; Miss Florence Sellers, of Portland, and Mrs. Fred Jackson, of Seattle, were winners.

Tom Stein Eliminated
The biggest upset of the thirty-third annual meet occurred yesterday when Monty Hill, a local youngster, eliminated Tom Stein, of Seattle, former western amateur champion, 4 and 3. Stein tied the course record with a 66 Tuesday and had been considered as one of the leading contenders for the 1930 crown.

Playing a sound, steady game, Frank Dolp had little trouble defeating Al Harrington, of Yakima, after a close morning round. Dolp won six holes in the afternoon to win 7 and 6.

Forest Watson, who won the title in 1928 and was low medalist in the qualifying round Monday, was figured to be Dolp's toughest opponent and the two may meet in the finals with Watson playing in the first bracket and the Portland veteran in the last.
