Churches Swing Into The Summer Vacation Period

First M. E. Church Sunday morning 11:30 o'clock pastor will speak on "The Call of Christ to the Methodist Church," including some reference to the late session of the general assembly. There will be a special service at 8:30 a. m.

First Baptist Church Sunday morning 11:30 o'clock pastor will speak on "The Call of Christ to the Baptist Church," including some reference to the late session of the general assembly. There will be a special service at 8:30 a. m.

"Is the Universe, including Man, Evolved by Automatic Forces?" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on June 22.

NO EXCUSE FOR UNCLEAN FRUIT

This is Message Given Scientists Today at Eugene by Dr. J. S. Jones.

EUGENE, Ore., June 20 (AP)—Declaring that there is now no excuse for the marketing of any but clean fruit, free of either worms or supposedly poisonous spray residue, Dr. J. S. Jones, chemist of Oregon State college, today told assembled members of the Pacific coast division of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, of progress made in treatment of apples, pears and other fruit. Scientists from the entire west are in session here.

Admitting that wormy fruit is unmarketable, and fruit with residues of spray materials too much in evidence, is questionable in the eyes of the consumer, Dr. Jones said experience of the last five years has shown that spray residue of all kinds at the time of harvest and packing can be removed from apples and pears at relatively light expense and with sufficient thoroughness "to meet the most exacting requirements of pure food officials."

"In some respects it seems strange that after half a century or more of experience in combatting insect enemies of garden, field and orchard crops, the producer must still rely upon the use of compounds whose elements are definitely associated in the minds of the public with virulent toxicity in humans," Dr. Jones said.

"In recent times the grower of apples and pears has been prominently before the consuming public because he has thoroughly satisfactorily substituted for arsenicals the so-called 'safer' chemicals. These have become firmly established, clean crops of apples and pears cannot be produced without frequent and liberal applications of arsenicals on the part of the producer throughout the growing season."

Dismissing the question of spray adhesion to the skins of fruit, a condition that is easily eliminated by use of one of the several washing baths available, Dr. Jones spoke at some length on the matter of arsenicals in the flesh of the fruit itself. Experiments indicate, he pointed out, that minute traces of arsenic, known as the "ubiquitous" element, are present in practically all organic cells. Publicly recently given to this fact has prompted a "fear" in some circles where it was not understood that the element in such minute quantities must be harmless.

Arsenic, he said, is present in practically all soils. Fruit taken from orchards known never to have been sprayed have been found to contain minute traces of arsenic, assimilated from the soil. Other orchards, principally those that have been sprayed with arsenic compounds, contain more arsenic in the soil, but none to such an extent as to warrant even passing uneasiness.

Dr. Jones pointed out that food products intended for interstate or foreign shipment must not contain arsenic, calculated as the tri-oxide, in excess of 1-100 grains per pound.

His analytical work shows, Dr. Jones declared, that pears and apples actually contain not more than from 14-10,000 to 49-10,000 grains per pound even from orchards where arsenic deposits are great.

"The maximum amount of arsenic then thus far found in the flesh of apples and pears in sprayed orchards is far below the tolerance established by pure food officials," the chemist declared.

Klamath Potatoes Planted Earlier

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., (AP)—Potato growers in the Klamath basin planted their acreages seven to ten days earlier this year than other years. C. A. Henderson, county agent, said.

This tendency toward earlier planting was somewhat influenced by time of planting demonstrations which were carried to completion in a year by four grower co-operatives with the county agent's office.

On average it was found that single drop seed planted between April 30 and May 10 gave the highest yields. The plan followed was one of planting two rows of single drop seed and two rows of cut seed every ten days starting April 10 and finishing June 10.

1/2 teaspoon salt. 1 teaspoon sugar. 3 egg yolks. 1-1/2 cups milk. 2 egg whites. 1 tablespoon butter, melted. Mix the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add the egg yolks and milk. Beat for 2 minutes. Fold in the remaining ingredients and cook on hot greased waffle irons.

Serve waffles as soon as they are made as they will become tough if allowed to stand.

Chats With Parents

Preventing Discouragement By Alice Judson Peale

Children often undertake a task with enthusiasm, work at it industriously for a time and then they lose interest and forget about it. The habit of leaving work unfinished is all too easily acquired and, as everyone knows, is unserviceable in any walk of life.

It is a wise parent who prevents a child from becoming discouraged with anything he has undertaken. If she is alert she sees to it in the first instance that her child does not undertake a task that is too difficult or sure to become tedious.

She knows her child's ability and carefully substitutes for an impossible project one which will be equally satisfactory to him, but which meets his abilities.

When in spite of her foresight, he does become discouraged midway in an undertaking, she does not hesitate to lend the helping hand that carries him over the hard spots.

She brings him through to the satisfaction of finishing what he has begun.

In developing good habits of workmanship in our children, there is one all-important point to be kept in mind and that is the child's feelings of success in anything he undertakes.

The younger the child, the more important it
