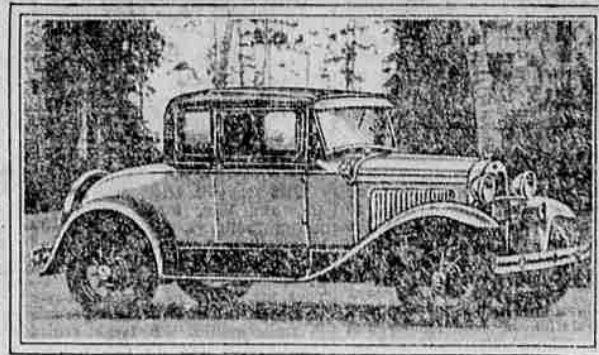

Green Banned On Persian And Arabian Autos

Green is not used in the color scheme of automobiles in Persia and Arabia as it is considered sacred, and dark red or maroon is reserved in Japan for members of the Imperial family, according to reports received by the Oregon State Motor association.

The motorists' organization pointed out that although color schemes are a matter of personal preference in the United States, they are taken more seriously in some foreign countries and are considered of great importance in many nations.

Being its statement on facts gathered by foreign attaches of the department of commerce and A. A. A. representatives abroad, the motorists' organization said that builders have anticipated the whims of all peoples.

Three Assembly Plants to Build Model AA Truck

Assembly of trucks has been started in the building formerly used as a branch headquarters by the Ford Motor company in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and announcement was made last month of the placing in similar operation soon of additional buildings formerly used by the company in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and on Long Island.

Since the construction of new assembly plants in Chester, Pennsylvania, and at Kenosha, the three buildings used previously for that purpose have been used for storage or displays of Ford products.

The Philadelphia plant was the first to be remodeled and set in operation. Its ten floors are being utilized according to the following arrangement: First floor—Lincoln showroom; second—permanent commercial transportation exhibit; third, fourth and fifth—storage of service stock for Models A, AA and TT; sixth and seventh—Lincoln service and stock, including Lincoln paint and body and trim repair shops; maintenance and general stores; eighth, ninth and tenth—truck assembly with chassis line, body and enamel department and paint shop.

In the permanent exhibit the fifty-three different units which are on display include equipment for twenty-four vocations or different lines of business. There is the complete Ford commercial line, both Model A and AA; and all of the body types of special equipment are mounted on the Ford chassis.

Among those displayed are fire apparatus; dump bodies of all types; hand, gravity and power lift; semi-trailer attachments; special house-to-house delivery bodies; street sweeper attachments; school bus and motor coach bodies; as well as equipment for every municipal use, and many types fitted to special agricultural needs.

This exhibit has proved most helpful in displaying the many practical uses of the Ford commercial line to prospects, as it enables the latter to see the particular equipment in which they are interested. The display room covers an area of nearly 30,000 square feet, and is tastefully decorated in antique plaster finished in old ivory.

Each of the truck assembly plants will serve the dealers in the territory in which the plant is located, as a unit under the direction of the branch.

Specialists On 2-Year Tour In Special Buick

A trio of nature specialists, acting at invitation of the U. S. department of Interior, and Horace M. Albright, director of the National Park Service, during the past few days fared forth on a tour which is expected to consume two years and result in extensive, beneficial wild life research in all the country's national parks.

The head of the research party is Professor Joseph Dickson of the University of California Museum of Vertebrate Zoology, who is accompanied by G. M. Wright, University of California graduate in forestry, and H. H. Thompson, philosophy and psychology graduate of Leland Stanford Junior University.

The extensive tour is being undertaken in a de-luxe truck, especially designed and constructed on a 1930 Buick passenger car body at commission of Mr. Wright.

Starting their journey from the San Francisco Bay district the exploring trip will first visit the Kaibab National Park on the northern rim of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. Yellowstone Park was next on the itinerary, after which the noted national reservations of the Pacific Northwest, the Yosemite in California and others were to be visited and explored.

"Problems to be given our utmost attention are typified by our planned studies of the great increase of deer in the Yosemite during recent years and the similar increase of the grizzly bear in Yellowstone," declared Professor Dickson. "Everyone agrees that such refugees for these animals are necessary for their continued existence, but deer and bear have increased in the respective parks in such numbers lately as to give grave concern to the authorities charged with their adequate feeding and control. We will attempt to in some degree solve this dilemma."

Immediately previous to starting on the expedition, Mr. Wright explained to Buick officials that it was the original intention of the party to utilize a regular commercial truck. Later, however, he stated, this plan was abandoned in favor of a special Buick job because of the latter's greater ease of riding and flexibility. Into the Buick have been built special compartments for the carrying of general camp equipment, delicate scientific instruments and complete motion and still photographic outfits.

MOTORISTS WARNED With Oregon's long summer season approaching, attention of motorists is called to the increased fire hazard that will result to forest and grain fields.

Care in handling lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches is urged by the Oregon State Motor association.

Motorists are advised that the Oregon traffic officers will enforce rigidly the provisions of the law prohibiting the throwing of lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles.

The law defines such an act as a misdemeanor punishable by a fine. Attention of motorists is also drawn to the fact that the law prohibits the use of muffler cut-outs, a source of fire hazard because of flying sparks.

GORED FARMER, BACK ON "CAT", TAKES IT EASY

It took a mad bull on a ten-minute campaign to put I. M. Boyer, of Oregon, on the disabled list last fall. The bull did a good job—too good for Boyer. When, with the help of Sister, Mother, Dad and the dog, the bull was finally corralled, the hospital surgeon's check-up showed a broken hip, all of the ribs on one side and four on the other broken, plus a crushed hand.

Did Boyer live? He not only survived the bull's attack, but after three months in the hospital and one or two in bed at home, he hobbled into his yard on crutches, climbed into his brand new "Caterpillar" Fifteen and began the spring work, says C. GAUGES AND LIGHTS REVEAL PRINCIPLE Gauges attached to the Deane drum cylinders on all four wheels of a Dodge Brothers Eight-in-Line chassis and electric lights mounted on each gauge are now being used to demonstrate publicly the inflexible law of physics by which the action of hydraulic brakes is automatically equalized.
