PROTEIN DIET IS  
VERY IMPORTANT  
State of Health of Human  
Beings Depend on it,  
Dr. Slonaker Says.

EUGENE, Ore., June 21 (AP)—  
Dr. James H. Slonaker, Stanford  
university, who addressed the  
western society of naturalists sec-  
tion of the American Association  
for the Advancement of Science  
here Friday, said that if man were  
to reach the highest point of ef-  
ficiency, the paramount necessity  
would be to make his diet consist of  
foods so that protein diet could be  
regulated to the best advantage.

"The state of health of human  
beings, the size and vigor of their  
children, in fact, how people as  
well as animals feel and act de-  
pends largely upon the protein diet," he said.

Dr. Slonaker said that the size  
of the offspring is not only regu-  
lated by the amount of protein in  
the diet of parents, but of the pro-  
teins in what its ancestors ate. Too  
much protein is detrimental, he  
said, except that the offsprings are  
larger in infancy and youth. This  
larger comes as a sacrifice, how-  
ever, for the reproductive span is  
shorter and the spontaneous ac-  
tivity of the being is lessened, Dr.  
Slonaker said.

Extensive Experiments  
The speaker said he had made  
extensive experiments on the Al-  
bino rat, regulating their diet by  
dividing them into five groups and  
giving each group a different per-  
centage of protein food. The life  
span of the rat is three years, he  
said, so he was able to make ob-  
servations through several gener-  
ations. Starting with 10 per cent as  
the lowest and 24 per cent as the  
highest, observations were  
made as to food intake, spontane-  
ous activity, reproductive ability as  
to number, character and vigor.

The results showed, he said, that  
practically all of the activities  
were greatest with rats given 14  
per cent protein while those given  
the highest showed the least ac-  
tivity with the exception of the size  
of their offspring.

Lieutenant V. O. Clapp, of the  
United States navy, who addressed  
the meteorological division, said  
that pilots of mail and transport  
planes whose routes lead over  
mountains must familiarize them-  
selves with the conditions of ice  
formations in order to avoid them  
before it is too late. In experi-  
ments conducted over the moun-  
tains of Oregon and Washington,  
Lieutenant Clapp found that freez-  
ing rain did not play a large part  
in the formation of ice.

"Through knowledge of the topog-  
raphy, forecasts and warnings of  
ice danger," he said, "must be the  
pilot's aids in overcoming this seri-  
ous danger."
