Chinese Girls Drive Out Whites In Taxi-Dance Halls of Shanghai

SHANGHAI (AP)—Chinese girls are learning to dance, and driving their white sisters out of trendy port dance halls.

The White Russian taxi-dance girls, exiles from soviet rule, are losing out before bright-eyed, sleek haired Chinese girls who charge less.

Girls, mothers and even grandmothers among the Russian refugees got jobs dancing with the white soldiers and sailors in Chinese port cities. Many had fathers, low children or jobless husbands to support.

But the Chinese can imitate anything, it is said, and now the oriental maidens have learned to dance European fashion.

Clad in ankle-length, vari-colored brocade, her neck encased in a high stiff collar, the Chinese girl is an attractive and striking figure.

Soviet Warned Must Tolerate Moslem Turks

(Associated Press Correspondent) ISTANBUL (AP)—Secular though the Turkish state has become, and strong as is her friendship with Soviet Russia, Turkish indignation over the religious situation in Russia has been expressed by the semi-official daily, "Djurnal."

The paper declares that the movement seeks to erase 25,000,000 Moslem Turks and their national ideals from Russia.

Citation is made of reports that 8,000 mosques have been closed in the district of Idli-Dural; that 14,000 Moslem worshippers have been condemned to death or deported; and that the Chief Mufti has been arrested for refusing to sign a statement that the Moslems in Russia have not been persecuted.

The Turkish paper warns the Soviet Union that limitation of Turks was one aim of the czars as it was their aim also to stretch their dominions to Istanbul and to kill the independence of Turkey—and in return, Turkey helped to kill the czars.

Turkey aided the Soviets because they promised to leave Turkey mistress of her own destiny and "it is friendship's duty to our part," the "Djurnal" concludes, "to remain the Soviets of these lessons of history."

DUBLIN (AP)—The Irish Free State parliament has decreed that the money raised by Republican bonds in Ireland and the United States can be regarded as a national liability and fully paid.

The Free State government is prepared to pay the balance to bondholders, though there is no compulsion to do so, and the liquidation is within the discretion of the Minister for Finance.

Some speculators in Ireland bought up bonds at a cheap rate. But the government will only pay either the original subscribers or those to whom the bonds may have been transferred for full value. This ruling applies also to America.
