Oregonians In Bad; Shoot And Kidnap Officer

SALT LAKE CITY, June 23—(AP)—Police announced yesterday that Earl J. Hobson, 30, and T. B. Wise, 30, held in the city jail here following their confession to the shooting and kidnaping of a motorcycle patrolman preceding a wild ride through ten northern Utah cities Saturday night during which they committed three robberies since they came here from Portland, Ore., Friday.

Information received here from Portland police stated that the men were well known to the police there. They admitted serving terms in the Oregon state penitentiary for robbery last year.

The men confessed to burglarizing a store and a service station at Layman, Utah, early Friday, and to breaking into a home here Friday night.

Motorcycle Officer Leland Daley was shot by Hobson while the officer was riding with the pair in their car to the police station after having arrested them on suspicion of automobile theft.

With Daley lying wounded in the back seat, the bandits robbed a service station here and sped away to Farmington, where they left Daley in care of a physician, staged two robberies and disarmed a state highway patrolman before continuing their flight.

Officers in four counties were on their trail and they were captured at Brigham City, sixty miles north, after their car broke down.

Harder Is Only A Kid, But He Wins His Games

CLEVELAND (AP)—The roster of the Cleveland Indians has undergone numerous changes in recent years due to the desire of the management to take the team from the role of a "threat" and place it into that of pennant winner.

Not the least happy of these innovations has been the introduction of the youthful, beaming countenance of Melvin Leroy Harder, who won't be 21 for some months yet.

With more than six weeks of the campaigning over, Harder placed his name in a spot not hard to find in the pitching records. It was right up there on top, and read six games won, and none lost.

As young as he is, this is not the first year that Harder spent in the big leagues. He came to the Indians in 1928, and spent the season at relief duty. He stayed on with the club into 1929, and was sent for seasoning to New Orleans in the Southern association.

There he was worked regularly, and won seven games while losing two. Earned runs scored against him averaged only 2.5 a game, and in 72 innings of pitching he allowed but 65 hits.

Harder was born in Beemer, Nebraska, and now is six feet and one inch tall, and weighs 170 pounds.

ROBINS SURPRISE MAJOR LEAGUES

Remain on Top Nearly a Month Despite Numerous Menacing Drives

Considering the closeness of the rivalry among the National league clubs, the tenure of the Robins as leader of the circuit is something really remarkable. The Robins, who caused something of a surprise when they first gained the top, have shown the way to their rivals for nearly a month despite numerous threats to their security.

After various ups and downs, the Robins took the lead at the end of May and have not been displaced since.

The costly Robin errors disappeared suddenly when first place was in danger while the Robins bats swung into effective action. Brooklyn came from behind yesterday, paced by two home runs by Babe Herman and one by Johnny Frederick to score six runs in the seventh and eighth innings off Larry Fench, Pirate pitcher, to win 5 to 6. The Cubs made two homers off the delivery of Fred Frankhouse, recent Boston acquisition, and one of them was Hank Wilson's 21st of the season, but they could not get any other counters while the Braves ten hits scored in three different innings taking the game 2-2.

Giants Gain

The New York Giants picked up a game on the Cubs, remaining three games behind, by putting on a performance similar to Brooklyn's. The Giants seemed to feel it necessary to perform in the traditional manner as Cincinnati celebrated Jennie Frey day. They got to Bonnie in the seventh and eighth for three runs at a time and took a 6 to 4 decision from the Reds.

The St. Louis Cardinals attained a 500 average again by taking two games from Philadelphia. The Cards clouted 33 hits against five Phillies pitchers to win by scores of 12 to 2 and 9 to 2. Clint Rhom and Burleigh Grimes, the latter making his first start for St. Louis, held the Phillies well under control.

The Detroit Tigers altered the American league standing a bit by winning a pair of games from the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 3 and 4 to 2. The double triumph while St. Louis was dividing a twin bill with the New York Yankees, put the Tigers into fifth place.
