Denial Issued By Hoss on New Speeding Law

SALEM, Oregon, June 22—Recent news stories purporting to quote Secretary of State, Hal E. Hoss as having issued rulings affecting the state speed law of 33 miles an hour, have been emphatically denied by Hoss, who said in a recent statement:

"Oregon's speed limits are fixed by the state legislature, and there has been no change from the 33 mile limit. Reports recently circulated would lead one to believe that I had encouraged fast travel on Oregon highways, but the story was unfounded. What I have in mind is a recommendation to the legislature next January that they fix a speed regulation in conformity to the national code being adopted uniformly throughout all the states, which has as its basic principle the substitution of 'recklessness' where speed in excess of the limitations is charged. This is strictly a matter for the state legislature, and I am not usurping their prerogatives."

"And in the meantime, the Oregon speed laws are just as effective as they ever were, and I have advised the state traffic division that anyone caught speeding should be shown absolutely no consideration because he thought the limits had been raised."
