Permits issued last week follow: June 1—Paul Wilson, to alter and repair a home on Lake street between Second and Third, work to cost \$250.

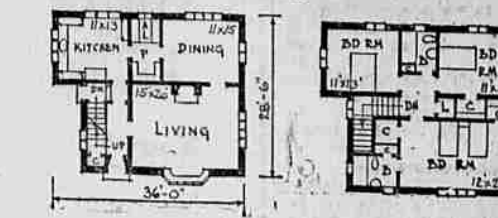
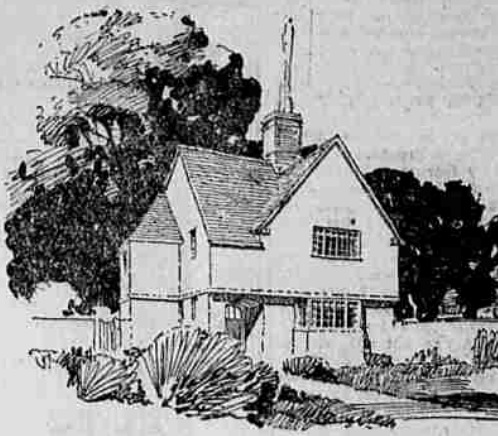
June 20—Masonic Building association for Nortons, to alter and repair a two-story brick building on Adams avenue between Elm and Fir, work to cost \$3,500.

PROSPERITY REGAINING STRIDE

Building activity in the cities of the Pacific northwest during May, according to the Pacific Builder and Engineer, registered a remarkable pickup on the 1929 record, indicating that the building program is starting a come-back in this area at least.

The northwest's May, 1930, total of \$5,011,681 is 102% of the \$4,906,172 for May, 1929. Washington's record for May, 1930, is \$4,220,188, which is 102% of \$4,131,906 for May, 1929.

EACH ROOM HAS CORNER



This small residence, patterned after houses found in English villages is of stucco, given only a slightly textured finish.

Instead of an entrance porch, the doorway is deeply revealed into the house wall. The second story projects slightly and the bay window which is the principal feature of the front facade juts out beyond the wall until it meets the overhang of the upper story.

Windows used throughout are of the metal casement type and the framing about them is of hand adzed timbers.

Entering through the main entrance, we find ourselves in a small hall with the stairway to the second floor on our left and the doorway to the living room at the right.

On the second floor three good-sized bedrooms and two baths have been provided.

Plans Weather Service For Aid Of Airplanes

BAKER, Ore., June 23—Julius C. Smith of the United States weather bureau was in Baker making arrangements for the establishment in Baker of an "intensive weather reporting service" for airplanes traveling the Pasco-Salt Lake route.

Establishment of this service will involve the employment of two men in addition to Harlan H. Smith, local weather observer. A three-hour reporting service is to be started July 1 and before winter an intermediate hourly service is expected to be placed in operation.

Under the three-hour plan, attaches of the local office will send out instrument reports every three hours both day and night. Eye weather observations will be taken and reports sent out every hour probably after September 1.

These reports will be placed on the wire here and will be available at all government aviation fields between Portland and Salt Lake City.

International Flare At Short Oregon Session

EUGENE, Ore. (Special)—A real international flare, in addition to the broadening influence of educators drawn from every part of the United States, marks the University of Oregon summer sessions opening at the Lincoln high school in Portland and on the campus at Eugene this week.

Teaching classes at the sessions, and available for lectures and special addresses will be Kiang-Hu, newly appointed professor of Chinese studies, McGill university, and Moises Saenz, assistant secretary of education, Republic of Mexico.

Professor Kiang-Hu, who is noted as an author of books in both English and Chinese, is holder of high Chinese degrees through competitive examinations and has been a professor at Peking Imperial university and Nanking Government university, as well as having done considerable teaching in this country.

Professor Saenz, who was educated both in the United States and Mexico, is known for research work in schools of Mexico and for his writings, and has had a long and varied career in school administration and other education work in his country.

Additional interest is attached to the summer session this year since two unique ventures, a summer cruise to Hawaii for 100 students and their faculty members, and a post session trip to Alaska are also on the schedule.

Nationally known educators who will be with the university for the sessions here and in Portland include Dr. Alexander Goldenweiser, famous anthropologist of Washington, D. C.; Dr. David Swedden, professor of history and education, Harris Teachers' college; Dr. Graec, M. Fernald, University of California at Los Angeles, and a number of others.

Of special interest in Portland will be the Platoon Demonstration school, to be maintained at Shattuck school, a short distance from Lincoln high school, where the regular session will be held.
