HOOVER VETO EXPECTED ON VETERAN BILL

bill over the chief executive's disapproval.

Battle Scene in House
Administration spokesmen held but little hope of sustaining the expected veto in the senate, but were more optimistic with regard to the house. A two-thirds vote of both branches of congress is necessary to override a presidential veto.

A caucus of house republicans will consider the problem tonight. A move was under way at that end of the capitol to work out a compromise more suitable to President Hoover in the event of a veto.

The bill passed the senate last night on a roll call which found but six ballots, all republicans, cast against the measure and 46 in its favor. Those who opposed it were Brigham and Wolcott, of Connecticut, Gillett, of Massachusetts, Hastings, of Delaware, Reed, of Pennsylvania, and Watson, of Indiana the majority leader.

Moses of New Hampshire, and Grundy, of Pennsylvania, were paired against the bill and Smoot, of Utah, opposed it but was unable to vote. All three are republicans.

Extends Compensation
As passed by the senate, the measure would liberalize existing veterans law and extend compensation up to \$100 a month to disabled ex-service men.

In addition, it would provide that disabilities becoming manifest to a ten per cent degree before January 1, 1930, shall be presumed to have been incurred in the service and to merit compensation on that basis. The present presumptive limit is January 1, 1925.

The bill also adds a long list of diseases to those covered by the presumptive clause. It would compensate veterans at eight dollars a month while receiving hospital treatment for diseases and injuries not received in line of duty, and give their wives \$30 a month if without children, \$40 a month if there is one child and six dollars additional if there is more than one child.

Limited to 3 Years
The operation of the measure would be limited to three years, with congress studying veterans problems meanwhile and subsequently adopting additional legislation.

President Hoover in his statement Sunday termed the bill inequitable and against best interests of the veterans themselves. He quoted Secretary Mellon as saying an increased rate of income taxation would probably be necessary if the bill is enacted into law.

Mellon Fears Deficit
This prediction was based upon an estimate the bill would require an additional outlay for veterans of \$102,000,000 during the next fiscal year. Mellon said a deficit was in prospect without this additional burden.
