### Gasoline Dealers Fighting Low Price

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24 (AP)—With gasoline prices ranging from 15 to 13 cents per gallon in San Francisco and the east bay region, members of the Retail Service Station Dealers' association last night decided on a campaign to maintain the 17-cent level.

A committee was appointed to attempt to swing independent dealers now selling at 13 cents, into line in maintaining a 17 cent price with a 3-cent "differentiating" surcharge. This, the association decided, it would seek cooperation of major oil companies and go on record as favoring 15-cent gasoline with a 2-cent differential.

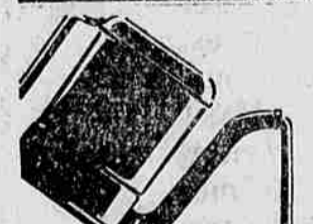
