QUEEN LOIS OF ROUND-UP



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1-2 cup orange juice.
3 tablespoons finely chopped mint.

1-2 cup water.
Chill cantaloupe. Cut out balls with small French vegetable cutter and chill. Mix rest of the ingredients. Cook slowly 4 minutes. Cool and chill. Pour over balls. Serve in glass cups which have been placed on green paper doilies on serving plates.
