Sacs Stay Out In Front In The Pacific League

Sacramento's staying power as sole holder of first place in the Pacific coast league remained intact yesterday in spite of the defeat of the Senators by Hollywood, 8 to 2, thanks to Seattle's ninth inning triumph over Los Angeles, 7 to 6. An Angel win would have given them a tie for the lead.

Turner of the Stars held Sacramento to five hits as the Hollywood outfit made it two straight, taking a four run lead in the first inning. Thomas, on the hill for the Sacs, went out in the seventh.

Knothe, Indian third baseman, clouded a two-bagger in the last half of the ninth with the bases full to overcome a Los Angeles lead and even the series at one game each. Lamanski was the winning pitcher.

San Francisco gained on the leaders by downing Portland easily, 7 to 2, Jimmy Zinn keeping the Ducks from hitting far, evening the series.

Herman Pillette of the Missions shut Oakland out after their three-run second inning, and the Reds won as Huff's second homer of the day accounted for the last tally.

Robins And Cubs Open Four-Game Chicago Series

Separated by one game, the Robins and the Cubs open a Chicago today a series of four games which probably will decide which team will reach July 4, the traditional turning point of the season, on top.

Brooklyn has held first place for about a month with a crippled Cub team hanging right onto the next rung of the ladder. The Robins did a little sliding yesterday as they lost their final game before invading Wrigley field to the Pittsburgh Pirates.

They can lose again today and still remain ahead, but only by a few percentage points.

The Robins could not hit offerings of Ray Kremer yesterday, getting but seven rather ineffective blows. Pittsburgh touched Dudley and Clark for eleven blows and a 5 to 1 victory.

The Cubs hit the Philadelphia pitching much more freely but barely pulled out the game by a 11 to 10 score to sweep the three game series and score their eighth victory in nine starts.

Gabby Hartnett drove in the winning run in the ninth inning after his two home runs and a single had brought in five other runs.

Reds Win Final Game
The Cincinnati Reds showed the New York Giants deeper into third place, by winning the series final, 11 to 9, to break even in the four games. Starting against an ace Red, Pete Donohue, they pounded out 14 hits while Red Lucas held the Giants to half that number.

It was Babe Ruth day again in the American league as the home run king hit two wallops of his favorite kind to lead the New York Yankees to a double victory over the St. Louis Browns in their third straight double header.

Ruth, hit his fifth and sixth home runs in the second game, heading a 10 hit attack that resulted in a 16 to 4 triumph after the Yanks had edged out a 5 to 4 victory in the opener.

Yankees Gain
The day's results were all in favor of the Yankees, leaving them only a half game behind Washington and two behind the league leading Philadelphia Athletics.

The Senators held onto second place by beating the Cleveland Indians for the fourth successive time, 12 to 5. Washington scored eleven runs in the seventh.

The Athletics got an even break with the Chicago White Sox, romping through the first game, 4 to 1. Chicago took the second, 7 to 2.

Jack Russell of the Boston Red Sox had just one bad inning against Detroit, the eighth, but that was enough to give the Tigers the game, 4 to 1.



Bobby Jones In Stands As U. S. Net Stars Win

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 26 (AP)—With Bobby and Mrs. Jones of Atlanta, Ga., among the distinguished guests in the stands, Miss Elisabeth Ryan, American resident of England, gave United States a flying start in today's play of the English tennis championship, when she defeated Miss Johanne Sibart, Belgium's No. 1 women's ranking player in straight sets, 6-2, 6-4.

Racing through twelve straight sets Mrs. Helen Wills Moody and Miss Ryan defeated Mrs. V. Burr and Miss G. N. Thompson, England, 6-3, 6-8, to become the favorites to win the English women's doubles championship.

Miss Mary Greif, youthful Kansas-City sensation, was eliminated by Miss Payot, experienced Swiss player, 6-4, 6-2.

Berkley Bell and Gregory Manning, alternates on the United States Davis' cup team, defeated Count Von Salm-Hoefstraten of Austria and Burr of England, 7-5, 6-4, 6-4.

Big Bill Tilden and his Dutch partner, H. Timmer, Holland, won their first doubles match, eliminating R. Deterring and J. R. Reddell, England, 6-4, 8-6, 6-2.

George Lott and Johnny Dowd, United States' doubles champions, were forced to the limit to defeat the English team of V. A. Cassell and J. C. Masterman, 8-6, 13-11, 7-5.

Miss Helen Jacobs, California, made short work of her match with Miss H. Stanley, England, winning 6-2, 6-0.

Babe Ruth Eight Days, 2 Homers Ahead of Record

CHICAGO, June 26 (AP)—Babe Ruth's home run "barometer" today disclosed the Big Bambino was exactly eight days and two homers ahead of his record breaking schedule of 1927.

He hit two circuit smashes yesterday to give him a season's total of 26. In 1927 he did not make his twenty-sixth until July 3. On June 25, 1927, he had only 24 or two less than his present crop.

Hack Wilson of the Cubs and Walter Berger of the Boston Braves are four blows behind Ruth's record-breaking pace and two behind Ruth's 1927 schedule. Hack came close yesterday against Philadelphia but didn't succeed while Berger was idle.

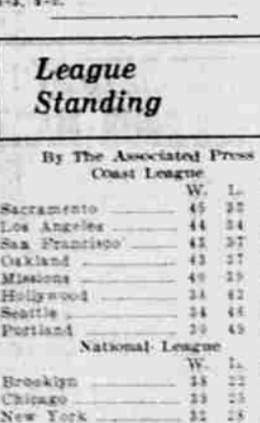
Unusual Twins
