

LABOR SURPLUS OVER THE STATE

Eleven Communities Report More Laborers than Required at Present.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26—Following is a report by C. H. Gram according to districts or localities of seasonal employment conditions in Oregon:

Portland—There is a surplus of workers here in all lines, both local and transient. Present indications point to a continuance of this condition throughout the entire season.

Gresham—There is a surplus of both common and skilled workers in this locality. Strawberries and green peas are now being picked, with more than sufficient help to fill all demands. This condition is expected to exist throughout the season.

Corvallis—There is a surplus of workers here in all lines and we expect this condition to exist throughout the season. Berries are being picked and we have more than sufficient help on hand.

McMinnville—There is nearly always a surplus of common labor on hand here. The hay harvest is now on with plenty of available help.

Salem—There is a surplus of labor in all lines, particularly married couples for farm work. Strawberries, cherries and hay harvest is now on, with plenty of help on hand. We expect to have plenty of help throughout the season.

Albany—There is a surplus of workers in all industries and we expect this condition to exist throughout the season. Raspberries, logan berries and black caps are the next crops, with plenty of help available.

Eugene—There is a surplus of workers, most noticeable in the lumber industry. Hay harvest is now on and the main cherry crop will be ready to pick in a few days.

The Dalles—There is a surplus of workers in all lines and we will have no difficulty in handling work throughout the season. Cherries are now being picked.

La Grande—There is a surplus of workers in all lines. The alfalfa harvest is now in progress, with plenty of help on hand.

Pendleton—There is a surplus of help in all lines. Hay and cherry harvest is now on, with plenty of help available.

Medford—There is a surplus of common labor in this locality. Peas will be harvested about August 4th. Will have plenty of help on hand.

ROSENBLUM IS WINNER OF TITLE

New York Light Heavyweight Defeats Jimmy Slattery to Gain Crown

BUFFALO, June 26 (AP)—Slapsie Maxey Rosenbloom, of New York, stood forth today as new champion of the light heavyweights, conqueror of the only man who ever consistently gave him trouble during his amazing fighting career in three divisions.

Maxie has whipped the best middleweights, some heavyweights, and now he has accounted for the last of the 175-pound top lighters who had held out against his discouraging ring attack.

Last night Rosenbloom whipped Jimmy Slattery before a crowd of 13,500 in the International league ball park here and with victory came the only championship he has ever fought for in ten years of battling outstanding ring men.

Five times before, the team of Slattery and Rosenbloom furnished the feature attraction along

various bypaths of England and in four of the engagements Jimmy, pride of Buffalo's first ward, gained victories.

Maxie Gets Revenge
Maxie won only one. Of all the men he has beaten, including Leo Lomsak, Ace Hudkins, Jimmy Braddock, Dave Shade, Larry Johnson and Pete Latzo, only Slattery was able to come back and defeat him consistently.

But last night, before \$55,000 worth of customers, Rosenbloom gained his revenge by winning the title Slattery has held since last February when he defeated Lou Scouza here and gained general recognition as the successor to Tommy Loughran, retired from the 175 pound ranks to joust with little success against the heavyweights.

The decision was close, gained by the award of two judges over Referee Patsy Haley's ballot for Slattery. A majority of critics gave Rosenbloom eight rounds, Slattery five, with two even.

No knockdowns although Slattery was staggered momentarily in the second and Rosenbloom was a bit wobbly from rights to the chin in the ninth, Slattery's best round.

Both were marked about the face, Rosenbloom with a bruise on his left cheek and a cut in the bridge of his nose while Jimmy's

lips were swollen and cut and his eye brows swollen. Maxie weighed 170½ to Slattery's 166½.
