Health Talks

SAVE A LIFE Had you the chance—you would save a life. Since you may never know when the opportunity might appear, be prepared—learn how to apply artificial respiration. Artificial respiration is frequently a life-saver in cases of suffocation. Suffocation, asphyxia, or smothering is due to lack of and inability to get oxygen into the body. The suffocation may be the result of water or blood in the lungs, or gas poisoning. It may also be due to an obstruction of the wind-pipe by foreign bodies, and to other agents mechanically interfering with the passage of air to the lungs. Failure of the breathing mechanism, due to brain or nerve injuries, may also bring on suffocation. The first thing to do in a case of suffocation is to clear the lungs of water, to remove the unconscious individual from the poison gas atmosphere, or to remove the foreign body from the wind-pipe, etc. Where the immediate cause of the suffocation cannot be removed, too much time should not be lost, and artificial respiration should be started at once, in the hope that there may be some small passageway open, large enough to keep the spark of life glowing. The most favored method is the "prone pressure," or Schaefer method. It is applied as follows: Place the patient face down after loosening his collar and any clothing constricting chest or abdomen. Clear mouth of any mucous, froth, tobacco or false teeth. Draw the tongue forward, and turn the head to one side so that the nostrils and mouth are not obstructed. Carry the patient's arms away from the body and into an extended position behind his head. Kneel astride the patient's hips (facing his head) and with the hands spread on the sides and back of the chest, make compression inward and upward on the chest by leaning forward with your weight on your hands. Hold this compression for about three seconds. With a gentle push throw your weight back on your heels, releasing the pressure on the chest. Continue this movement at the rate of 12 to 16 times to the minute. A cloth saturated with aromatic spirits of ammonia may be placed or held near the nostrils from time to time.

Roast Lamb, stuffed
Buttered New Potatoes
Creamed Peas
Head Lettuce Cherry Butter
Vegetable Salad in Gelatin
Rhubarb Betty Spiced Hard Sauce
Coffee
Stuffing
2 cups bread crumbs.
3 tablespoons butter, melted.
1 tablespoon chopped parsley.
1 tablespoon chopped onion.
1/4 teaspoon celery salt.
1/4 teaspoon pepper.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1 egg.
2 tablespoons hot milk.
Lightly mix ingredients with fork. Stuff the cut made in roast of lamb.
Vegetable Salad in Gelatin
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.
1 1/2 cups boiling water.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon vinegar.
1 tablespoon sugar.
1/4 teaspoon pepper.
1 cup diced cucumbers.
1/2 cup diced celery.
3 tablespoons chopped pimientos.
1 tablespoon finely chopped onion.
Pour boiling water over gelatin mixture and stir until it has dissolved. Add salt, vinegar, sugar and pepper. Allow to cool and thicken.
