Cherry Season In Umatilla Co. Comes to Close

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1 (Sp)—Portland wholesale market for butter and eggs today ruled steady, especially on top grades of each commodity, with prices unchanged.

Butter receipts were rather light but ample for a limited demand in force.

Egg demand was fairly active. Some price shading was evident, quality considered.

Country dressed meats and poultry continued steady, supplies sufficient for a fair demand.

The cherry season in Umatilla county was brought to a close last weekend with the final car of fresh cherries loaded for eastern shipment on Saturday, from the Milton-Freewater district. Returns to growers averaged about 80¢ per lb. for all varieties.

Although this is above cost of production, it is much lower than returns of the preceding two or three years. Smaller sizes than usual accounted in part for the lower returns. The Dalles and Hood River are now shipping heavily. Cherry loadings from Yastina and Wenatchee districts are now well over their season's peak.

At Portland, strawberries, cauliflower, asparagus and lettuce were all stronger today, due to generally lighter supplies.

Close Heavy Today In Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, July 1 (Sp)—The regular market prices were suddenly terminated in today's stock market, and pivotal shares were generally depressed 1 to more than 5 points under yesterday's final levels.

The close was heavy. Sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.

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Admiral Beatty Attacks London Naval Treaties

LONDON, July 1 (Sp)—Earl Beatty, admiral of the fleet, attacked the London naval treaties vigorously in the House of Lords today. He declared England was the only nation under the treaty that made any disarmament or reduction of its sea strength.

Admiral Beatty told the lords that Britain was obliged to make such reduction that she was rendered impotent and incapable of maintaining control over the various parts of her farflung empire.

"In the United States," Earl said, "the conference has had the result of increasing their armaments in cruisers by no less than 235,000 tons. Japan is increasing her cruiser tonnage by ten per cent. France is not restricted in any way. She has built three 10,000-ton cruisers. She is building three more and has authorized another ten.

"Italy has built two cruisers, is building four and has authorized another."

WASHINGTON, July 1 (Sp)—President Hoover has decided to call the senate into special session for consideration of the London naval treaty next Monday, if congress adjourns this week.

Congressional leaders were making a drive today to assure an adjournment by Thursday night to permit a holiday over the fourth of July.
