Privilege Abuses Hinted In Salem  
SALEM, Ore., July 1 (AP)—The monthly fund for automobile mileage included in the expense accounts of state officials and employees has reached a point where abuse of privilege is suspected by officials who do so do with the advance and disbursement of state funds and there is talk of asking the next legislature to fix a maximum mileage that may be charged for cars privately owned by persons on the state payroll but used on official business. The records show that officials and employees of some departments are charging as high as 12 cents a mile and others as low as 5 cents.
