RULES FOR MOTHER

Punishment, I am tempted to believe, is the last resort of mothers whose mistakes have found them out. Here are a few rules which are carried out, should fairly obviate the unhappy necessity for punishment.

Observe faithfully your child's routine. He then will know once and for all what to expect and need not be fussed to make a new adjustment each day.

While he is little do not allow anyone to bully or tease him. Never snatch anything from his hands. Get him to relinquish an undesirable plaything voluntarily.

Praise him liberally when he has done as you have asked.

Be honest with him. Tell the truth always, not only to him but to all other members of the household. Respect his possessions.

Give him adequate play space, a room of his own if possible and an abundance of proper play materials.

During the first years simplify his environment as much as possible so that he need not forever be told what he must not do.

Give him few commands and only such as are absolutely necessary. Give them simply and clearly. See that they are obeyed. Never ask a child to do more than one thing at a time.

Provide him with plenty of companionship as soon as he can tolerate.

Protect him from the over stimulation and fatigue that comes from too long, too strenuous play and too much adult society.

Dwell on his good qualities. Give him opportunities to be good and to win your approval.

Respect him as a person and show that you have faith in his wish to do what is right.

Publisher Is In Race For Senate Toga vs. Norris

OMAHA, Neb., (AP)—Entrance of Gilbert M. Hitchcock into the race for the Nebraska senate seat held by George W. Norris sets the stage for what may be one of the most spectacular battles of the 1930 campaign.

Hitchcock, publisher of the Omaha World-Herald, is the only democratic senator ever elected from Nebraska for more than one term. He served from 1910 to 1922.

During the war he was chairman of the foreign relations committee of the senate under President Wilson, and his defeat in 1922 was generally credited to his support of the treaty of Versailles.

He went to the senate in 1910 from the house of representatives, with a long tradition. His father, Phineas Hitchcock, an early Nebraska pioneer, once was a republican senator from Nebraska.

After graduation from the law college of Michigan university in the early eighties, and spending some time in study in Germany, Hitchcock decided to become a newspaper man.

He established the Omaha World in 1888 and consolidated it with the Omaha Herald in 1889, creating the World-Herald, which he still owns and publishes.

Leaving the family political tradition of republicanism, he became a democrat and fought the only battle of "16 to 1" with William Jennings Bryan, then a young Nebraska lawyer.

To give Bryan an additional voice Hitchcock made him editor of his paper before the Chicago convention of 1896, when Bryan was nominated for president.

In later years, however, Bryan and Hitchcock had parted political company. Bryan following his affiliation with prohibition, denounced Hitchcock in speeches.

Hitchcock was the choice of the Nebraska democratic presidential reference primary in 1920 and 1928.

Rare Air May Prevent Aviators From Beating New Altitude Marks

WASHINGTON (AP)—It may be a long time before man is able to surpass Lieut. Apollo Soucek's world record for altitude in flight.

Scientists doubt whether fliers will be able to improve much on his peak ceiling of 43,164 feet—simply because of air conditions at extreme altitudes.

When Lieutenant Soucek reached a point nearly eight and one-fifth miles off the earth, he experienced a pressure of 2.38 pounds a square inch—in contrast to nearly 15 pounds at sea level.

"It may mean death to go higher," said Dr. Frederick Ceres, medical inspector at the Anacostia air station, "because of the body's want of oxygen." He examined Soucek before his flights.

The critical point lies between 40,000 and 50,000 feet, where "starvation" begins when the vehicles which carry oxygen in the blood stream are unable, because of the decreased pressure, to release their load to the tissues," Dr. Ceres explained.

"These vehicles are the oxyhemoglobin and they give no warning to the pilot that he has reached the limit. He may lapse into unconsciousness and die before the ship can drop to the atmosphere necessary to sustain life."

Lieut. Soucek provided for emergencies by equipping his tiny biplane with automatic controls. These controls throttle the motor before it would whirl itself to pieces and allow the ship to circle downward until he could regain his senses.

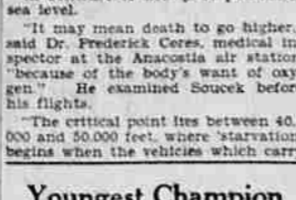
Greater altitudes than Soucek reached, it is believed, may be possible with ships in which the pilot may sit in an airtight compartment at normal pressure, and with improved motors that can "breathe" to better advantage in rare atmosphere.

While there is a marked decrease in air pressure, Lieut. Soucek found that temperature is nearly constant.

On the record flight a thermometer in the air stream registered 67 degrees below zero, centigrade, while the cockpit temperature dropped to 32 degrees below zero.

The trace on the official barograph showed a heroic flight at peak ceiling where, with the propeller blades beating almost without effect in the thin air, the pilot strained for extra inches and each move sent the ship down to 42,000 feet.
