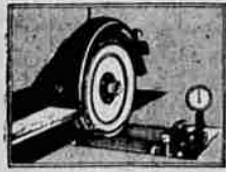

Fourth of July Trade Stimulates Market Activity

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2 (AP)—Butter and egg prices ruled steady in Portland wholesale trade today with moderate interest shown by buyers in each product. Country dressed meat and poultry prices were unchanged with demand about steady.

The U. S. bureau of markets summary said: Trading on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market shows considerable activity this week, in anticipation of the weekend holiday trade. Few price changes were noted today, although strength is shown in lettuce, tomatoes, celery, and strawberries.

First carload of Arizona cantaloupes is in and selling from \$4.25 to \$4.50 per crate, 25 cents higher than Imperial valley crates. Yakima corn, new arrival, is priced at \$4.00 per crate. Lettuce in mixed cars is being quoted as high as \$2.50 per crate of No. 1 leaf stock.

Green pea shipments are probably about at the season's peak, with total U. S. shipments of 58 cars yesterday. Oregon shipping point prices continue weak. With warmer weather, peas are now being loaded in the lettuce crates again, heavily iced within the crates. Current sales in carlots range from 5c to 6c per lb. Oregon's loadings are now light, until the telephone variety matures.

Tomatoes are higher priced and quality is better than earlier California shipments.

STOCK MARKET LISTLESS; NO BIG CHANGES

NEW YORK, July 2 (AP)—Intent only on killing time until the holiday, the stock market was a listless affair today. Mildly optimistic steel trade reviews provided some support for the list, after a moderate easing off during the morning. By early afternoon, advances of 2 points or so were numerous among important issues.

New developments on the whole indicated anything but decisive changes in business activity. The midyear condition statements of New York banks, while showing curtailment in earnings, probably owing to lower interest rates and smaller profits by investment affiliates, showed the Wall Street institutions are in excellent condition to finance a recovery in business when it arrives.

The ability of the list to rise despite the fact that trading was at the slowest pace in two years strengthened sentiment in the last hour when U. S. Steel advanced to 160. American Telephone, General Electric, Westinghouse Electric, American Can, Standard Oil of New Jersey and Paramount-Public gained one to four points. The close was strong. Sales approximated 1,220,000 shares.

grasses used for hay purposes. Irrigated pastures are now coming into their best and those having herds of dairy cows say they are doing exceptionally good under present feed conditions. Farmers in the hill sections who have much summerfallow this year have found this spring and summer a very good one for getting the soil plowed in extra good shape and the moisture which has been well up during the greater part of the time has given them a good opportunity of getting much of the weeds to germinate and then be killed by constant cultivation. A little late plowing is still being done at a few of the large farms, however, the greater part of the large tracts were finished as long as two weeks ago and the most of it has been worked two and three times and getting into good shape. Haying has been in progress at several of the valley farms during the past week and more are expecting to commence cutting their first crops of alfalfa during the coming week. Much of the north woods sections are full of sheep at this time. A number of large bands have arrived here recently from distant points in the state for ranging on logged off range lands there. Mr. Daugherty, of Pilot Rock, arrived here recently with two large bands of sheep which were trailed through having been about three weeks on the road. Some of the sheepmen feel that with high freight rates and extremely low prices for lambs and wool that they cannot afford to have the sheep shipped to the summer ranges here as some have done during the past number of years. A few of the farmers of the Leap community finished shearing their small flocks of sheep recently. According to reports from many of the small owners the bulk of the wool produced in this community has been marketed at prices ranging from 17c to 20c per pound. Practically no sales of lambs has been made here and a number of the sheepmen are wondering what kind of prices they are going to be able to get for their lambs. Good green feed in all pastures and ranges are making ideal conditions for growing some of the best lambs which have been seen in this section for a number of years. Shipments of cattle and hogs have gone from this county during the past two weeks through the Willows County Shipping association to the Portland market. Arrangements are being made to send out at least one carload of fat ewes some time during the early part of July. E. F. Johnson was busy during the early part of the week getting many small lots of wool together for shipment. W. F. Poole and wife returned home recently from a trip to Baker. They report very heavy rains in that section and that hundreds of acres of hay were down. J. F. Haun, of Evans, made a business trip to Pendleton during the past week. He reports crops looking quite good in that section. Sam Meek and Giles Plass were busy the early part of the week doing some work in smoothing the recently worked road leading into the Leap community. Meek and Mrs. Eva Parker were visiting at the E. R. Bobbitts home at Enterprise the latter part of the week. A number of farmers of this community report that they have found places in their winter wheat fields where considerable damage has been done to the crop by recent freezing.
