## Tilden Explains Why He Will Not Join U. S. Team

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—The North American Newspaper Alliance today published an explanation from William T. Tilden as to why he had refused an invitation to join the American team for the interzone finals and the challenge round of the Davis cup.

Declaring the invitation had come too late, Tilden said it would be unfair to ask a release from his contract with the alliance "at this late date." Under United States Lawn Tennis Association rules, no player may write currently of a tournament in which he is participating.

John N. Wheeler, general manager of the alliance, called the Philadelphia offer to release him from his contract. Wheeler's cable said "I feel your playing will give the United States an excellent chance of victory and I am willing to waive my rights."

Big Bill pointed out he and Frank Hunter had announced their retirement from Davis cup play at the U. S. L. T. A.'s annual meeting in February. After the meeting, Tilden said he signed his newspaper contracts, involving coverage of the international matches.

"At that time," he went on, "the U. S. L. T. A. announced it would pin its faith on a young team for 1930. From then until July 4 I was not approached to play nor requested to do so."

Tilden added he had been in consultation with Fitz Eugene Dixon, non-playing captain of the team, and had offered to aid in the training and practice of the team in Paris until the challenge round, granting the United States beats Japan or Italy, the European finalists.
