HELEN SAILS FOR AMERICA WITH TROPHIES

LONDON, July 8 (AP)—Mrs. Helen Willis Moody today ended a successful tennis tour of Europe when she sailed for home with the women's Wimbledon singles championship and a share in the women's doubles crown.

Mrs. Moody was presented with two gold medals, at the station, by the vice president of the British lawn tennis association.

"English tennis is improving," Mrs. Moody asserted. "You did not win any titles at Wimbledon but that was just bad luck," she told a London newspaper interviewer.

Mrs. Moody continued: "I always enjoy Wimbledon more than any other tournament and my final match against Elizabeth Ryan was splendid. I tried to get her into the American Wightman Cup team, but as you know I could not manage it."

Mrs. Moody said her lawn tennis plans for the next year were not settled. "I never plan that far ahead," she declared.

"I want to come over again next year and probably shall."

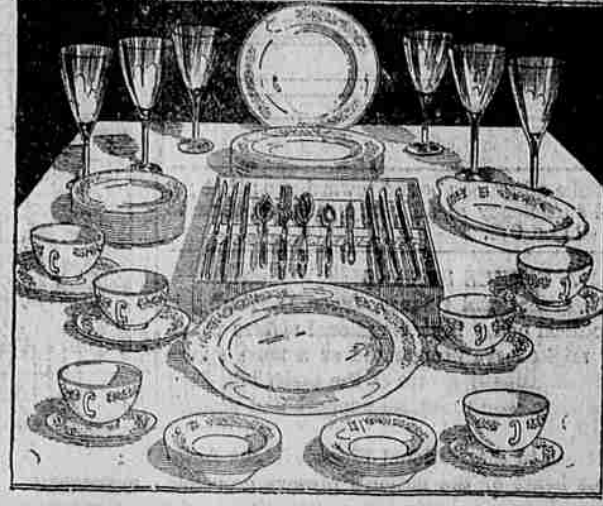
Death Valley Well Salted

West Virginia Cake
(With hot milk)

4 eggs.
2 cups sugar.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/4 teaspoon lemon extract.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
3 cups flour.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
1 cup hot milk.
4 teaspoons butter.

Beat eggs, add sugar and beat until creamy. Add extracts, salt, flour and baking powder. Add butter to hot milk and mix well, combine with egg mixture and beat 3 minutes. Pour into shallow pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven.

This recipe makes quite a large sheet of cake that will cut into 20 squares.

Chocolate Frosting
(Quickly made)

1 square chocolate.
1-3 cup water.
1 tablespoon butter.
1 tablespoon cream.
1-8 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1-3 cup sifted confectioner's sugar.

Cook slowly, stirring constantly, the chocolate, water and butter until chocolate has melted. Add other ingredients and beat thoroughly. Let stand several minutes and then beat well and frost the cake.

Doctor's Trial On In Portland

PORTLAND, July 8 (AP)—The trial of Dr. Charles J. Dean, chain physician, operating clinics here, San Francisco and Los Angeles, charged with violation of the national bankruptcy act, continued today.

In his opening statement John W. McCulloch, assistant United States attorney, said was charged with transferring a note and mortgage valued at \$9200 to the D. & B. Investment company of which Dean's father was the principal owner.

The transfer was made, the attorney declared, while Dean was contemplating bankruptcy.
