PENDLETON, Ore., July 8—The Round-Up, Pendleton's big community show, is kept in the minds of people of the Eastern Oregon city all the year long, but the months of July and August find them particularly busy in preparation for the Western exhibition August 28, 29 and 30.

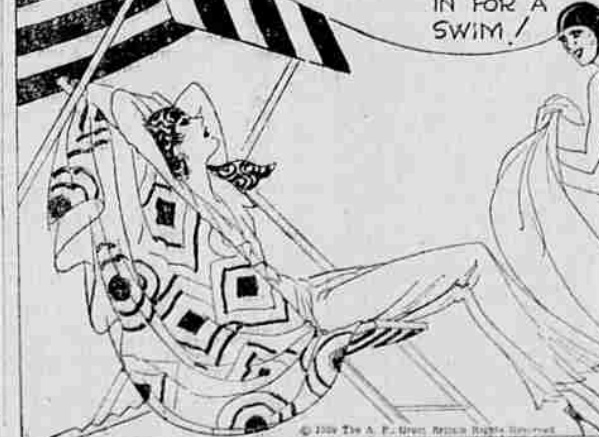

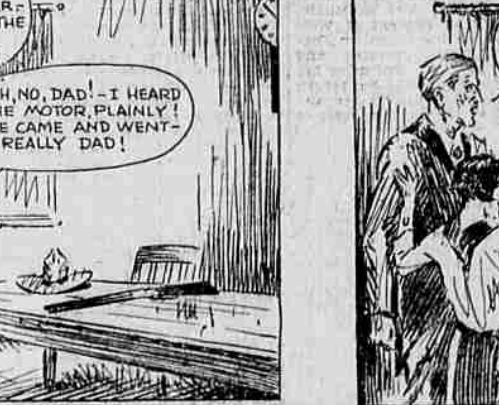

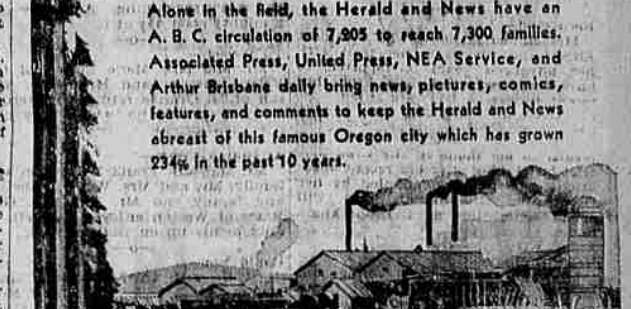
