Secret Inquiry Into Slaying Of Lingle Opened

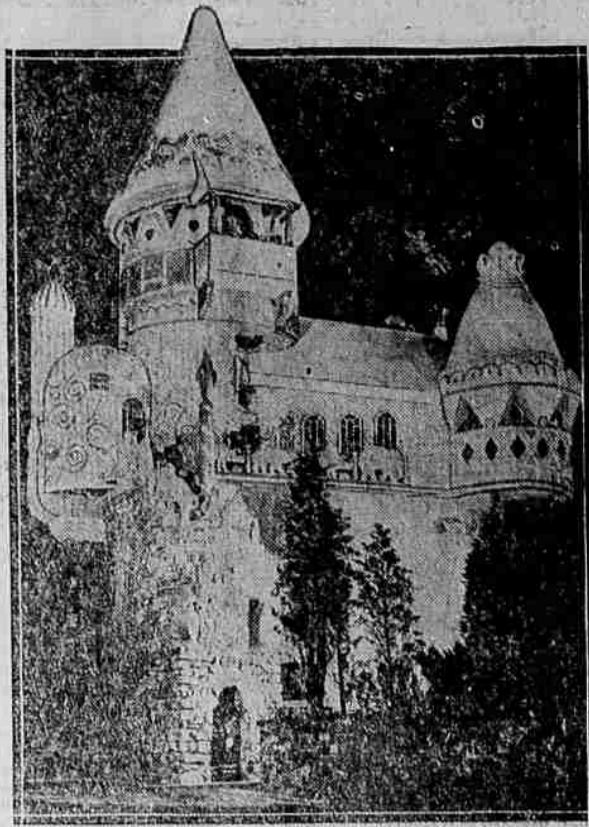
CHICAGO, July 9 (AP)—A secret inquiry into the slaying of Jake Lingle, crime reporter, was begun yesterday by the Chicago church federation, entirely apart from the official investigation of the assassination begun yesterday by the July grand jury.

The inquisitorial committee of the church federation, representing congregations totaling 600,000 summoned as its first witness Alderman Arthur Albert, city councilman, who demanded but failed to get a council investigation of Lingle's reported alliance with police officers and gangsters.

The opening of the inquiries was marked with the assassination of James Phillip, 45, newspaper dealer, shot down by three gunmen as he went to his news stand. Police attributed this shooting to extortionists, of a bootlegger's gang.

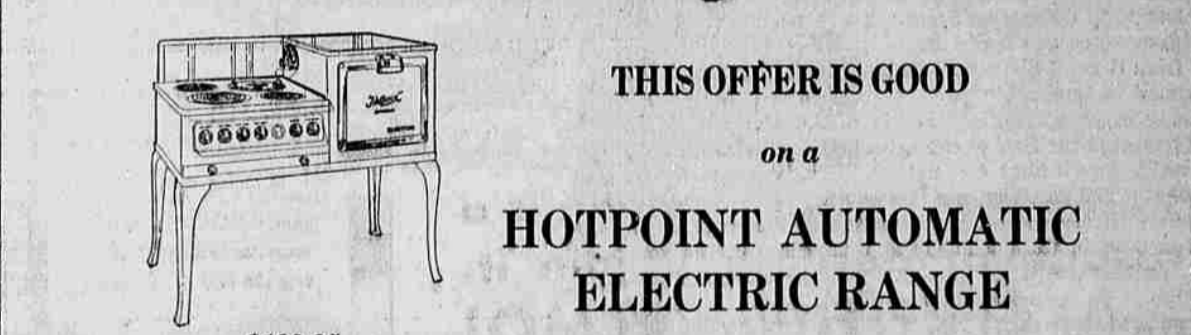
