MASSIVE NEW VAULT MADE FOR QUAKES

NEW YORK (AP)—Even earthquakes won't endanger wealth stored in the world's largest vault being built for the Bank of Japan.

The giant strong room will surpass in size and weight even the vault of the Federal Reserve bank of New York, at present the world's largest.

Three layers of heavy steel plates weighing 2,500 tons, each more than a half inch thick, with joints overlapping, will line the walls to resist the rending action of earth shocks.

Walls are to be of reinforced concrete, four feet thick.

The vault will have two floors, each 100 by 200 feet, as large as the entire floor space of a small bank.

The six main doors, each 36 inches thick and weighing 70 tons, will contain drill-resistant chrome steel, a secret alloy to resist oxy-acetylene torches, and chemicals which, when released by a torch or drill, will penetrate any gas mask.

There also are three private shipside warehouses and five additional private warehouses that have easy means of access to the public wharves.

Cotton shipped through the public warehouse for the seasons ending August 31, 1929 was 199,061 bales. The port ranks second in the United States in cargo traffic.

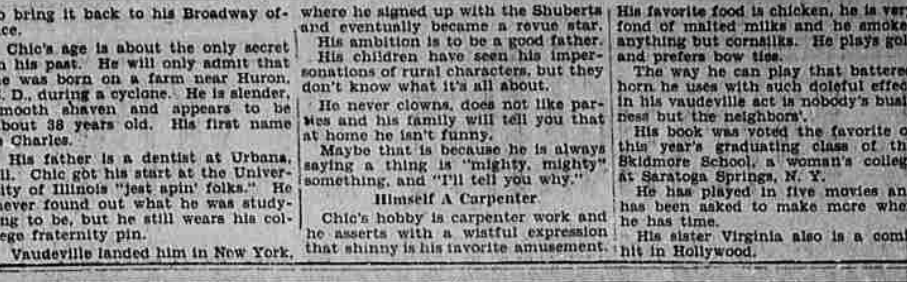
